Advocacy & Policy

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is comprised of the Elect, Candidates, the Catechetical Team, Sponsors, family members and friends. Here are comments from this year's RCIA:

- The RCIA process at Assumption has deepened my faith and taught me so much about my call to become a Catholic. The Easter Vigil was so beautiful, and personal. I will treasure that night of my life always.
- I wasn't nervous, just super-excited – I had waited for this for forever!
- The night made me realize how lucky I am to be able to choose my faith. The community here accepts and supports me just as I am. Incredibly excited to know the same thing was happening all over the world at the same time.
- The night was different than I had expected. Very moving ceremony – almost started crying when my son was baptized – it made me feel very connected to the community.
- I got chills watching the light move through the church – and I started tingling when Missy started singing. The best part of the night was watching people's faces light up as the candles were lit.
- It never gets old – it's a blessing to see this happen every year and knowing I had something to do with it.
- The night is a visible sign of Christ living in us.
- Hearing the Litany of the Saints – it's a feeling that there's something out there greater than ourselves – I could feel them there.
- This was a culmination of a really long journey – I felt so proud of everybody and how far they had come.
- The night reminded me of my own baptism and the need to make the commitment everyday to live my faith.
- Baptism is a sign of the change that has already taken place in their hearts.
- Baptism makes us not only a child of God, but brothers and sisters – we are all part of the same community.
- I felt a sense of commitment the entire night. I've felt like a part of the community since the very first time we went up on the altar and everyone raised their hands to bless us.
- The Eucharist gave me a sense of peace that I've never experienced in other churches.
- The Eucharist was the final piece of the puzzle for me. I felt really calm and in touch with everything.
- My first thought in receiving Communion was, "don't mess up!" But then I felt a sense of belonging to the community and being a part of the body of Christ.
- Saying what we believed in from the pulpit – it was powerful; If you have faith, you have to share that with others and show it to the world.
- I found the R.C.I.A program is awesome! It has really helped me with my faith journey and not to mention I now have a ton of people I can now call friends! The team members and sponsors are amazing and without them the program would not be possible. All of their countless hours volunteering their time to spend with us is remarkable. The Easter Vigil was fantastic! I felt HIM the entire time I was there. This experience will forever be something that I will truly remember and hold dear to my heart. The next day, I still had a huge smile on my face.
- I was a sponsor and felt blessed to think I was able to participate in such an awesome experience.
- Speaking as a sponsor the RCIA path is unbelievable, refreshing and an experience, in life, that nothing compares to. While I look forward to each and every week the best part of RCIA, for me, is the climax to the 7 months of in depth study and reflection into Jesus and his teachings, with the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening. Standing on the altar and watching the individuals being baptized, confirmed and receiving Holy Eucharist, I can see and feel the cleansing of sin and the Holy Spirit coming down upon each and every one of them. It's a wonderful feeling to know that I assisted another person down their path of learning about and finding Jesus in their hearts.



Jubilee Year of Mercy

Merciful like the Father, is the “motto” of this Holy Year. In mercy, we find proof of how God loves us. He gives his entire self, always, freely, asking nothing in return. He comes to our aid whenever we call upon him. What a beautiful thing that the Church begins her daily prayer with the words, “O God, come to my assistance. O Lord, make haste to help me” (*Ps 70:2*)! The assistance we ask for is already the first step of God’s mercy toward us. He comes to assist us in our weakness. And his help consists in helping us accept his presence and closeness to us. Day after day, touched by his compassion, we also can become compassionate towards others.

Mercy

In this Holy Year, we look forward to the experience of opening our hearts to those living on the outermost fringes of society: fringes which modern society itself creates. How many uncertain and painful situations there are in the world today! How many are the wounds borne by the flesh of those who have no voice because their cry is muffled and drowned out by the indifference of the rich! During this Jubilee, the Church will be called even more to heal these wounds, to assuage them with the oil of consolation, to bind them with mercy and cure them with solidarity and vigilant care. Let us not fall into humiliating indifference or a monotonous routine that prevents us from discovering what is new! Let us ward off destructive cynicism! Let us open our eyes and see the misery of the world, the wounds of our brothers and sisters who are denied their dignity, and let us recognize that we are compelled to heed their cry for help! May we reach out to them and support them so they can feel the warmth of our presence, our friendship, and our fraternity! May their cry become our own, and together may we break down the barriers of indifference that too often reign supreme and mask our hypocrisy and egoism!

It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the *corporal and spiritual works of mercy*. It will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty. And let us enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God’s mercy. Jesus introduces us to these works of mercy in his preaching so that we can know whether or not we are living as his disciples. — **14-15**


Sacristan Ministry
