

Give the Devil His Due

The serpent makes his first appearance in our first reading from Genesis today; and the devil joins Jesus, tempting him in the desert. He also shows up in the book of Job as the satan; then again in the Book of Revelation as "the huge dragon, the ancient serpent, who is called Devil and Satan, who deceived the whole world (12:9)" when he does battle with Michael the Archangel. We may also add references to "Lucifer", or "Morning Star" in Isaiah 14, Ezekiel 28 and

Ephesians. And Jesus refers to the "evil one," even including it in the Lord's Prayer; He also drives out demons in many of his healing encounters.

What are we to learn from all these references to the devil in our Sacred Scriptures? I am reluctant to admit it; and I even less frequently say it out loud: "there is evil in the world." And there is also evil in me. Whether it is an energy from the psyche of a culture in travail or an actual spirit which has freedom to move among us, this deceiver is active in the world. From the tiny whispers that give us permission to tell half-truths to our neighbors to the frightening shouts that compel us to hate and harm others, this carrier of sin and death is a part of our experience. Whether we experience it as a subtle permission toward unhealthy behavior or a bitter resentment which is an anchor around our neck, we need to join Jesus in His rebuke, "Get behind me, satan."

Here is what else we learn: EVERY TIME satan, the deceiver, the evil one, temptation appears in the scriptures, he is defeated. While we must take him seriously, he will NEVER have power over us. The challenge in our spiritual life and the invitation on this first Sunday of Lent, is for us to invite satan into the light. The temptations are real. But once they are in the light they are fully exposed as empty promises. We know the most seductive invitations in our lives never lead to life. The glittery and sensual frivolity which seems so glamorous in the dim light of Mardis Gras night are exposed as drunken disillusioned journeys down all the wrong paths in the light of Ash Wednesday morning. As difficult as it is some times; we all must face our demons in the light of day, in the light of Christ. They cannot have any power over us. The victory has been won. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, the Christ of God, our humanity has been sanctified, each one of us as a beloved child of God and all of us as the very Body of Christ.

This morning (Wednesday) I woke to pain and suffering in the lives of so many whom I

love. I was tempted to despair. Yet already, by 6:44 am, I have been inspired by the very ones who suffer to trust the power of love, to trust the power of God's Spirit at work in us, to trust the healing power of Christ dwelling in our hearts, to claim victory, even now over sin and death in every corner of my life and in every corner of the earth. Our God saves!



Rite of Sending...Rite of Election

Starting with Ash Wednesday we begin our Lenten journey and The Purification and Enlightenment period. This weekend we will celebrate the Rite of Sending at the 8:00AM Mass. In the afternoon, these same men, women and their sponsors will celebrate the Rite of Election at the Cathedral with the Bishop. The sponsors present their testimony to the Bishop that these men and women are ready to continue their journey to receive sacraments at the Easter Vigil. Their names are presented and accepted by the bishop.

We also have witnessed these men and women each Sunday and we also support their readiness to enter a more spiritual journey to the Easter Vigil. Those not baptized will now be called The Elect.

In the coming weeks, we will spend more time on spiritual reflection. This is a time that we invite the whole community to walk our journey with us. We will focus on those things that we need to "fix" in our life. This is a time of spiritual renewal, conversion and inner reflections. During this period the Catechumens (The Elect) and Candidates undertake several Rites, including the Scrutiny's and Presentations. They look to the Church to help them deepen their commitments and purify their hearts.

Praying for our Catechumens and Candidates

This weekend we will distribute prayer cards at all Masses. Each man, woman and child are invited to take multiple cards and journey with them through your prayers to the Easter Vigil. Children are invited to draw pictures and share stories of how they are praying for them.

Please return these prayer cards by April 2 in the RCIA Prayer box that will be placed in the back of church. Please continue to pray for our men and women... and our entire community.





The Stations of the Cross

The most important reason for reviving the practice of making the Stations of the Cross is that it is a powerful way to contemplate, and enter into, the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. It takes the reflection on the passion out of our heads, and makes it an imaginative exercise. It can involve our senses, our own experiences and our emotions... to the extent that - we come to *experience* the love of Jesus for us.

The History:

From the earliest of days, followers of Jesus told the story of His passion, death and resurrection. When pilgrims came to see Jerusalem, they were anxious to see the sites where Jesus was. These sites become important holy connections with Jesus. Eventually, following in the footsteps of the Lord, along the way of the cross, became a part of the pilgrimage visit. The stations, as we know them today, came about when it was no longer easy or even possible to visit the holy sites. In the 1500's, villages all over Europe started creating "replicas" of the way of the cross, with small shrines commemorating the places along the route in Jerusalem. Eventually, these shrines became the set of 14 stations we now know and were placed in almost every Catholic Church in the world.

If you have never reflected on the Stations before...

We encourage you to attend as many of our Stations of the Cross during these upcoming Lenten days! The most important thing to remember is that this can be as personal as you'd like it to be. One of our common religious struggles is to realize that we are not alone. The Good News is that Jesus entered into our life's experience completely - even suffering and death - and that He fell into the hands of a Loving God, who raised him from death to life. We can have complete hope that suffering and death have no complete hold on us. And, along the way, we are not alone.

So, try the stations, and experience the consolation they offer. And return often, to be renewed in this intimate experience of Jesus' solidarity with all humanity in our way of the cross each day.

HAVE YOU WONDERED WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO DURING LENT?

Q. Why do we say that there are forty days of Lent? When you count all the days from Ash

Wednesday through Holy Saturday, there are 46.

A. It might be more accurate to say that there is the forty day fast within Lent. Historically, Lent has varied from a week to three weeks to the present configuration of 46 days. The forty day fast, however, has been more stable. The Sundays of Lent are certainly part of the Time of Lent, but they are not prescribed days of fast and abstinence.

Q. So does that mean that when we give something up for Lent, such as candy, we can have it on Sundays?

A.Apart from the prescribed days of fast and abstinence on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and the days of abstinence every Friday of Lent, Catholics have traditionally chosen additional penitential practices for the whole Time of Lent. These practices are disciplinary in nature and often more effective if they are continuous, i.e., kept on Sundays as well. That being said, such practices are not regulated by the Church, but by individual conscience.

Q. I understand that all the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat, but I'm not sure what is classified as meat. Does meat include chicken and dairy products?

A. Abstinence laws consider that meat comes only from animals such as chickens, cows, sheep or pigs --- all of which live on land. Birds are also considered meat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are technically not forbidden. However, moral theologians have traditionally taught that we should abstain from all animal-derived products (except foods such as gelatin, butter, cheese and eggs, which do not have any meat taste). Fish are a different category of animal. Salt and freshwater species of fish, amphibians, reptiles, (cold-blooded animals) and shellfish are permitted.

Q. I've noticed that restaurants and grocery stores advertise specials on expensive types of fish and seafood on Fridays during Lent. Some of my Catholic friends take advantage of these deals, but somehow I don't feel right treating myself to the lobster special on Fridays during Lent.

A. While fish, lobster and other shellfish are not considered meat and can be consumed on days of abstinence, indulging in the lavish buffet at your favorite seafood place sort of misses the point. Abstaining from meat and other indulgences during Lent is a penitential practice. On the Fridays of Lent, we remember the sacrifice of Christ on Good Friday and unite ourselves with that sacrifice through abstinence and prayer.

Q. I understand that Catholics ages 18 to 59 should fast on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, but what exactly are the rules for these fasts?

A.Fasting on these days means we can have only one full, meatless meal. Some food can be taken at the other regular meal times if necessary, but combined they should be less than a full meal. Liquids are allowed at any time, but no solid food should be consumed between meals.

Q. Are there exemptions other than for age from the requirement to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Fri-

day? A. Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.


