Jubilee Year of Mercy

The appeal Jesus makes to the text from the book of the prophet Hosea – "I desire love and not sacrifice" (6:6) – is important... Jesus



affirms that, from that time onward, the rule of life for his disciples must place mercy at the center, as Jesus himself demonstrated by sharing meals with sinners. Mercy, once again, is revealed as a fundamental aspect of Jesus' mission. This is truly challenging to his hearers, who would draw the line at a formal respect for the law. Jesus, on the other hand, goes beyond the law; the company he keeps with those the law considers sinners makes us realize the depth of his mercy.

The Apostle Paul makes a similar journey. Prior to meeting Jesus on the road to Damascus, he dedicated his life to

pursuing the justice of the law with zeal (cf. Phil 3:6). His conversion to Christ led him to turn that vision upside down, to the point that he would write to the Galatians: "We have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justi-



fied by faith in Christ, and not by works of the law, because by works of the law shall no one be justified" (2:16).

Paul's understanding of justice changes radically. He now places faith first, not justice. Salvation comes not through the observance of the law, but through faith in Jesus Christ, who in his death and resurrection brings salvation together with a mercy that justifies. God's justice now becomes the liberating force for those oppressed by slavery to sin and its consequences. God's justice is his mercy (cf. Ps 51:11-16). – *Francis, Bishop of Rome, Servant of the Servants of God*

Charlaine's healthy twins

1) **My name is Charlaine.** I'm 32 years old and mother of four. Thanks to prenatal care and everything I've learned about maternal nutrition and feeding infants and young children, my twin babies are much healthier than my older children were. With my first two, now 7 and 4, I followed traditional feeding practices, which meant discontinuing breastfeeding and introducing solid foods at two months. As a result, my children were frequently sick and they did not grow well. We wondered if their stunting was the result of witchcraft or a curse on the family. The frequency of disease destabilized our household.

1) Through the program, though, I learned the benefits of exclusively breastfeeding for the first six months. I am careful to practice good hygiene like washing my hands before handling food or breastfeeding, after changing the babies' linens or using the latrine, keeping food protected from flies, and reheating food before eating. I have found that diseases that were common in my first two babies have disappeared. We have food now, and peace has returned to our home, which has allowed us to save some money for the education of our children.

I am so happy to have been selected to educate other mothers during well-baby consultations based on my example of good nutritional practices.

2) My name is Masangu. I'm a 57-year-old farmer with eight children aged 2 to 22. I have a 2.5-acre farm where I've usually grown maize and beans. Although I worked very hard, I could not produce good crops to support my family. As a result, our family was very poor and did not have enough to eat. My children did not develop properly and are stunted. Last year, my 3 youngest were often sick with diarrhea, malaria and respiratory infections. We did not have enough money for our children to attend school and they are currently illiterate.

Prior to participating in the program, some of the traditional agricultural techniques I used were burning the bush to clear the land for planting, planting the same things in the same areas, and not protecting the soil against erosion. I also did not know that different crops needed different amounts of space, and I did not use improved seeds.

Through the program, I have received farm tools, improved seeds (beans, groundnuts, soya and maize), fruit trees (orange, mandarin and banana), and training and support in sustainable agriculture techniques.

The quantity I was able to harvest was very good and will make a huge difference for my family. For the first time in many years everyone is able to eat three meals a day and no one goes hungry. I can see that my children are healthier.

I am storing a big quantity of this harvest which I will sell when the price rises, and am also saving a portion to use as seed next season. I know that by continuing to practice what I have learned through this program I will be able to meet the needs of my family and will even be able to start sending my children to school.

graduating from St. Blaise, I attended DeSmet Jesuit High School until graduating in 2007. THE MEANING OF PENTECOST

Acts 2:2-4 – "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind. . . . And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost."

This is one of the most amazing stories in the world. There is none which should be more interesting to Christian people, for it is the story of the launch of the Christian Church. It is the story of how the Church which had been slowly shaping in the quietness and obscurity of that Upper Room became aware of life and power... and set out upon its mission.

So far, these men and women have been rather ordinary people, their love for Jesus Christ the one thing keeping them together. They were perplexed, terribly timid, and very aware of their weaknesses. Then, as they waited, all of a sudden as it seemed, something happened which changed their personalities. They became aware of a unity which broke down every other barrier. They found themselves in possession of faculties they had never dreamed could be theirs. They lost all fear of people and all thought of themselves. They were fired with a message, and a passion to tell people about it, to spread the good news of a love which had flooded their lives and carried them off their feet.

What did it mean to the apostles' to receive the Holy Spirit?

It meant that God's power of immediate contact was in their lives. That was the great thing which the Spirit signified for them. They realized that God was in contact with them, was within their very souls. They did not need any kind of outside help. They could go out and face the world and be confident that God would back them up; that somehow His very Spirit was in living touch with theirs, that deep down in the place where the mind did its thinking, the heart its loving, and where courage and hope lies within. They knew that somehow Jesus was there within them by His Spirit, active and loving and gracious, able to make new men and women of them, able to revive their courage and faith so that they could face anything. That was what the Spirit meant to them.

What a new power it would give us to realize this---that God is within. What a new vitality it would bring to our prayer to realize that He does not stand without us but already manifests Himself in our hearts... to the very urge that sends us to our knees.

What they found was that through Him they possessed a root of life, a spirit alive in their souls, growing up in them, shaping character from within and finding its outlet in a certain way of life and service and in all their attitudes to one another. They found that they could think with His mind and were not slavishly dependent upon His words. The life was in them as an original impulse, breaking out in them in a way of feeling and thinking and doing.

Jesus laid down no rules---He communicates a Spirit. And the measure in which we have that Spirit... is the measure of the freedom and reality of our own Christian lives. Come Holy Spirit, COME!




