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The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph



On this Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph we are invited to see the world through their eyes. In the Gospel story of Jesus' presentation in the Temple we hear the beautiful Canticle of Simeon, which is prayed every night by the Church: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel (Lk 2:29-32)." God's saving power, revealed in Jesus, God made human, is for all the world. God has turned the table on Caesar Augustus. Caesar wanted to enroll the whole world under his power; God used the census to reveal His Kingdom in a manger, in Bethlehem, the City of David. And from the shepherds to the Magi and now to Simeon, we see that this light which has come into the world is for all the nations.

I encourage all of us to read the whole story of Abram and Sarai, Chapters 12-50 of Genesis. Our first reading today offers a glimpse from chapter 15 and another glimpse from chapter 21, reminding us of God's faithfulness and God's desire to draw all nations to Himself. The whole story includes God's promises to Ishmael and Isaac, Abraham's sacrifice of Ishmael and Isaac. I am especially fond of Ishmael, the first son of Abram, born of Hagar. Because we worship the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, we might forget that God is also the God of Sarah, Rebekah and Rachel. And we rarely remember that God is the God of Ishmael and Esau, of Hagar and Leah. God's desire has always been that all are saved.

We are the ones who now live in the light of Christ, who bear Christ in our hearts, indeed even in our bones and our blood; we are the ones who are nourished by the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist. So we echo Simeon's canticle, proclaiming the Holy Family as salvation for the whole world. We too are sent to find the outcasts, the foreigners, the wounded, the lost and the frightened...all who have walked in darkness. We have a story to tell. We have love to share. We have life to give. It is the Word become flesh, the light which has come into the world, and the darkness cannot overcome it.



As we honor the Holy Family today, let us pledge ourselves to continue their mission, to follow Mary in her mission of bringing Christ to every corner of our souls and to every corner of the earth.

Stewardship: A grateful Response to God's Love

Stewards see everything good as gifts received from God and they respond in gratitude with the gift of self.

Formation - Continuous Conversion

"Being a disciple is not just something else to do, alongside many other things suitable for Christians, it is a total way of life and requires continuing conversion." from USCCB's Stewardship a Disciple's Response - Pastoral Letter on Stewardship. Formation is a formidable task, involving education fo the mind and conversion of the heart. To know the "stewardship way of life", does not make one live a "stewardship way of life." Ongoing Catholic education is important if we are to grow in our lives as stewards.

Service - Love in Action

Epiphany Home Blessing

One interesting custom for Epiphany is for families to ask God's blessing on our own homes. The ritual calls for parents to mark, with blessed chalk, the main entrance door with the initials of the Magi and a code of the current year. This year's mark will be:

20 + C + M + B + 18

The numbers stand for the year in which the blessing is inscribed (2018). The letters stand for the names traditionally given the Magi who found the Christ Child: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They are also an abbreviation for the Latin blessing: Christus mansionem benedicat, or "Christ bless this dwelling." Blessed chalk and holy water will be available after masses the weekend of January 6/7.

Gather your family at the main entrance to your home. All make the sign of the cross.

- Parent: "Let us praise God, who fills our hearts and homes with peace. Blessed be God forever."
- Family: "Blessed be God forever"
- Parent or reader: (reading from Sacred Scripture)

"And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage." *Matt 2:10-11*

Parent imparts the blessing:

"Lord God of heaven and earth, You revealed Your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill them with the light of Christ, that their concern for others may reflect Your love. We ask this though Christ, our Lord."

Family: "Amen"

Then the parent sprinkles holy water on those gathered and sprinkles it about the home.

All are invited to bring a bottle from home for you to gather Holy Water from our Baptismal Font to help celebrate this Feast and to assist in your blessing."

We celebrate today the Feast of the Holy Family so it is natural that the readings have to do with how family members relate to one another. Most are probably not aware that the calendar which we follow as Catholics is the result of revisions which occurred in 1969. After all, that is almost 50 years ago. In any case, this

feast is always celebrated in what is called the Octave of Christmas, or now on the first Sunday after Christmas. The feast was instituted by Pope Leo XIII in 1893.

Today is a day to celebrate not only the Holy Family, but the idea of family in general. No matter how we may define ourselves we are a part of a family. What is important to know is that this Feast is dedicated to the entire Holy Family. Each in their own right (Jesus, Mary, and Joseph) has their own feasts. This feast commemorates the life of the Holy Family together and the focus is, or should be, on religious family life.

We have cited the Second Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians previously as it outlines what is required for a stable family life. Paul says, "*Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another.*" It is not easy, of course, but if members of a family can be compassionate, kind, humble, gentle, patient, and forgiving, then the family is bound to be more unified, more stable, and more of a unit.

And then Paul makes his most definitive statement about family relationships: "And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection." Love is the summary of all things St. Paul recommends. If each member of a family loves the others, that fulfills what God requires of us in all relationships. We do not know much about Jesus as a child through holy scripture, but we can certainly draw conclusions from what we do know. Mary and Joseph were devout Jews and parents. They obeyed God's commands. The circumcision and purification ceremonies were necessary as reminders that all were born in sin. Jesus, of course, was born without sin, and might seem to be excused from this tradition, but even as an infant He identified with sinners, just as He later did at His baptism, and on the Cross.

Note the statement in the Gospel that: "Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtle doves or two young pigeons." It is clear in the Old Testament (Leviticus 12) that at the birth of a son a lamb is to be offered as part of the purification and dedication ceremony. However, it was allowed for a family to offer two birds if they could not afford a lamb. The offering of two birds instead of the lamb was technically called "the offering of the poor." Jesus was born into a humble and poor family, another reminder to us that He and His family might be very much like us. The Gospel goes on to proclaim that "The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom."

"Growing in wisdom" is a sign that Jesus developed spiritually. Admittedly, He is not like all others. As a five year old, He must have had a grasp of life and reality that some of us still do not have. We may not know much of Jesus' life or His family from this time until He was 12 years old. Nevertheless, we do not need to know all the details to fully appreciate that this family was special, different, Holy. The Holy Family should continue to be an inspiration and an example to us.

Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God – January 1, 2018 *In part, Homily from our Holy Father, Pope Francis...*

"Mary treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart! (Lk 2:19). In these words, Luke describes the attitude with which Mary took in all that they had experienced in those days. Far from trying to understand or master the situation, Mary is the woman who can treasure, that is to say, protect and guard in her heart, the passage of God in the life of his people. Deep within, she had learned to listen to the heartbeat of her Son, and that in turn taught her, throughout her life, to discover God's heartbeat in history. She learned how to be a mother, and in that learning process she gave Jesus the beautiful experience of knowing what it is to be a Son. In Mary, the eternal Word not only became flesh, but also learned to recognize the maternal tenderness of God. With Mary, the God-Child learned to listen to the yearnings, the troubles, the joys and the hopes of the people of the promise. With Mary, he discovered himself a Son of God's faithful people.



In the Gospels, Mary appears as a woman of few words, with no great speeches or deeds, but with an attentive gaze capable of guarding the life and mission of her Son, and for this reason, of everything that he loves. She was able to watch over the beginnings of the first Christian community, and in this way she learned to be the mother of a multitude. She drew near to the most diverse situations in order to sow hope. She accompanied the crosses borne in the silence of her children's hearts. How many devotions, shrines and chapels in the most far-off places, how many pictures in our homes, remind us of this great truth. Mary gave us a mother's warmth, the warmth that shelters us amid troubles, the maternal warmth that keeps anything or anyone from extinguishing in the heart of the Church the revolution of tenderness inaugurated by her Son. Where there is a mother, there is tenderness. By her motherhood, Mary shows us that humility and tenderness are not virtues of the weak but of the strong. She teaches us that we do not have to mistreat others in order to feel important (cf. Evangelii Gaudium, 288). God's holy people has always acknowledged and hailed her as the Holy Mother of God.

To celebrate Mary as Mother of God and our mother at the beginning of the new year means recalling a certainty that will accompany our days: we are a people with a Mother; we are not orphans.

To begin the year by recalling God's goodness in the maternal face of Mary, in the maternal face of the Church, in the faces of our own mothers, protects us from the corrosive disease of being "spiritual orphans". It is the sense of being orphaned that the soul experiences when it feels motherless and lacking the tenderness of God, when the sense of belonging to a family, a people, a land, to our God, grows dim. This sense of being orphaned lodges in a narcissistic heart capable of looking only to itself and its own interests. It grows when what we forget that life is a gift we have received – and owe to others – a gift we are called to share in this common home. Celebrating the feast of the Holy Mother of God makes us smile once more as we realize that we are a people, that we belong, that only within a community, within a family, can we as persons find the "climate", the "warmth" that enables us to grow in humanity, and not merely as objects meant to "consume and be consumed".

To celebrate the feast of the Holy Mother of God reminds us that we are not interchangeable items of merchandise or information processors. We are children, we are family, we are God's People. I invite you to acclaim it three times, like the faithful of Ephesus: *Holy Mother of God, Holy Mother of God, Holy Mother of God!*"
