Notes about a Mass of Christian Burial

<p>Placing Pall Cloth <i>(only if casket is present)</i></p>	<p>The Pall is a large white cloth, which is placed on the casket after it is sprinkled with holy water. The Pall and the sprinkling are reminders of our baptism into Christ's life and death, in hope of Resurrection. Many can be a part of placing the cloth on the casket.</p>
<p>Procession <i>(when urn is present)</i></p>	<p>For a cremation, it is fitting to carry the urn in procession and carry it out at end. There will be a round-top, high-table in the front of church (~3ft diameter) on which the urn and other objects can be placed (candle, photo, memento of person's life (tackle box, sewing case, hammer, baking tin, etc.))</p>
<p>(Eulogy)</p>	<p>These remarks are given near the beginning of Mass to give us a sense of the person's life. The remarks should call us all into this sacred time of worship and remembrance. The Eulogy must be submitted in writing at least a day before the Funeral Mass <u>and follow the Eulogy Guidelines</u>. Eulogy can be emailed (<i>see guidelines</i>) or a copy can be placed in the drop box outside the parish office.</p> <p>While we do not often have eulogies at funerals, it is an option for families. Eulogies and other remarks given at post-funeral receptions or during the visitation/wake service are not time-restricted do not have to follow the Eulogy Guidelines. For Funeral/Memorial Masses, the guidelines help ensure that we keep the Eucharist at the central focus in the celebration of a Christian burial.</p>

Readings/Lectors

All 3 scripture readings should try to capture some quality of the person's life and/or offer a message of faith, hope, encouragement that speaks to our time of grief and remembrance. This packet offers a variety of scripture choices that would be fitting for a funeral. However, nearly any Bible verse/passage can be used. If you have a scripture you'd like to use, that's not listed in the packet, discuss that with your priest or with the funeral coordinator. The only restriction is that there can only be 1 reading from a gospel book (i.e. Mark, Matthew, Luke, John).

One person can do the 1st and 2nd Readings and the Petitions, or 3 different people could each take one of these roles, or multiple people could each read one of the petitions. It depends on how many people a family wants to involve in the Mass. For a funeral, readers need to be old enough to read and have a sense a reverence for this role at Mass. The church can provide individuals for this, if necessary.

<p>1st Reading:</p>	<p>Choose 1 selection from Group 1 (the Old Testament)</p>
<p>2nd Reading:</p>	<p>Choose 1 selection from Group 2 (the letters of the New Testament)</p>
<p>Gospel Reading <i>(read by Priest)</i></p>	<p>Choose 1 selection from Group G (a gospel from Mark, Matthew, Luke, or John)</p>
<p>Petitions</p>	<p>It is customary to have universal prayers, called Petitions or intercessions. These prayers 1) pray for the soul of the deceased 2) pray for the family of the deceased 3) pray for all who are assembled 4) pray for all who have died.</p> <p>Occasionally a petition is also included for a special cause or connection of the deceased (those battling cancer, the military, various groups/organizations at church, research being done to eradicate an illness) or a word of thanks/blessing for the care provided by a medical group or other caregivers. Each petition ends with "We pray to the Lord" and everyone responds "Lord, Hear our Prayer." If you are composing your own prayers, these need to be approved prior to the Mass.</p>

Bring Eucharistic Gifts forward

We present bread and wine, which will be used during the Eucharist. We also present our very lives, along with the life of our deceased loved one. We need at least 2 people to carry the bread and wine, but many can accompany them as a symbol of the offering of our lives. The church can provide individuals for this, if necessary.

<p>Ministers of Communion</p>	<p>5 lay ministers + the priest are usually sufficient. Volunteers do not have to be Assumption Communion Ministers. Communion Ministers must be practicing Catholics who are at least 18. The church can provide ministers if necessary.</p>

Guidelines for Flowers at a Funeral

Assumption realizes that often a deceased's loved ones express their emotions through the presentation of floral arrangements and greenery.

Families may display as much of this in the Narthex as is reasonable, without creating hazardous or cramped/constrained conditions. Only 2 arrangements may be brought into church for the Mass. These must sit on the floor (no stands or laddered easels) and will be placed on the bottom sanctuary step in line with the 2 diagonal aisles. Families are permitted to carry forward single flowers during the Offertory procession if they choose, but will need to provide a vase.

**ALL FLOWERS MUST BE TAKEN BY THE FAMILY AFTER MASS –
NO FLORAL ARRANGEMENTS/PLANTS MAY BE LEFT IN CHURCH**

Guidelines for Eulogies

- The *purpose of the eulogy* is to give those in attendance a sense of the life of the deceased. It is a broad overview of the qualities that have made this individual a unique gift from God.
 - Please avoid stories that would only include yourself in such a way that they would only (or mainly) be meaningful to you and your relationship with your loved one. These kinds of stories can give the impression that the eulogy is your personal time to work through your grief.
- The eulogy is normally between 2-4 minutes, 5 minutes is the maximum.
- **A final written copy of the eulogy must be presented to the priest at least one day before the funeral Mass.** It can be hand delivered to the parish office, put in the drop box outside the parish office door, or e-mailed to our funeral coordinator, Amanda, at amanda.assumptionbvm@gmail.com
- The eulogy is delivered at the beginning of the Mass, after the opening song and when introduced by the priest. Delivering the eulogy at this time prepares the community to participate in the funeral more meaningfully by allowing everyone to hear about the person as preparation for scripture and the rest of the Mass.
- The eulogy is read at the lower cantor's microphone. It should be read slowly and loudly while standing close to the microphone. A support person (s) may stand next to the eulogist if desired.

For families working through a funeral home, these stipends are customarily already included in the amount paid to the funeral home. The funeral then prepares checks/cash and takes care of delivering these stipends on the day of service. When a funeral home is not involved, it is customary to make checks out to or pay cash directly to individual ministers.

After Funeral Luncheon

Only available for the families of deceased registered parishioners Subject to the availability of facilities and capacity of the ministry. There is no set cost for this luncheon, though families may make a contribution if they wish. A gift in any amount will be accepted. A suggested donation is \$2.00 per person. Checks can be made to Assumption Church and/or included in the check for the use of the church.

Cemetery/Burial

Regarding a loved one's body or cremated remains, the Church reverences both equally and instructs the faithful to follow the proper burial of a casket or urn.

Burial in our cemetery and interment in our Columbarium is only available to registered parishioners. Plots/niches cannot be sold or transferred.

Columbarium Niche (holds 2 urns)	\$2,000
Standard Single Plot	\$2,000
Infant/Child Plot	\$ 150
Burial of an Urn in a plot already owned/occupied	\$ 500

All plot interments must have a concrete container or vault. Niche interments must be in an approved/sealed urn. Church does not provide urns. Weekend burials/interments may require a separate personnel fee. For all ground burials, there is a fee associated with digging/opening the grave. Church does not provide grave markers. Any monument company can be used for markers. Please refer to guidelines in booklet you received at plot/niche purchase.

No family will be denied the opportunity to celebrate a funeral or Memorial Mass due to an inability to pay. In moments of death and burial, our singular concern is providing care for the bereaved and brokenhearted. Please contact our Director of Pastoral Ministry or our Lay Pastoral Associate if you would like to discuss options of financial assistance with the above listed liturgical costs.

If a loved one dies at home, whom should I call?

If Hospice is caring for a family – contact the on-call Hospice Nurse
Otherwise, call 9-1-1.

It is a good idea to have on hand any advance directives (i.e. DNR (do-not-resuscitate) document) if applicable. Without one, paramedics will generally start emergency procedures and, except in localities where it is permitted to pronounce death, take the person to an emergency room for a doctor to make the declaration.
