Hello,

This Tuesday, September 5, we celebrate the memorial of St. Teresa of Calcutta, or as many of us remember her, Mother Teresa. She was only canonized a saint seven years ago, having only died 26 years ago. In my lifetime, (which I'm reminded recently is getting kind of long), I have to believe she is the one person who worldwide, across different cultures and faiths, was respected for her work, her faith, her sincerity, her love, more than anyone I can think of. This little woman living in a slum in India could get the attention of the world and world leaders. Receiving the



Nobel Peace Prize in 1979 probably brought her more notoriety and attention then she would have had without it, yet while her work for the poor and dying was being honored it needs to be recognized that many would just ignore her when she said things they didn't want to hear.

Reading through her acceptance speech for her Nobel Prize I was surprised to see how much of it was focused on what she described in her speech as "the greatest destroyer of peace today—the cry of the innocent unborn child." Reading over numerous reviews and comments about Mother Teresa there would often be some comment about her views on abortion as conservative or problematic. It is interesting to read how so many may honor and respect her for the great work she did for the poor and dying, showing honor and respect herself for those society would dismiss or consider a burden. And then these same people would not understand why she would be against abortion.

Some other critiques also questioned some of the people she accepted donations from and the method of care used in her hospices. While I don't want to focus too much on these comments, I also don't care for the version of saints' lives where they appear perfect their entire lives, and we don't question anything they did because they are a saint. The title of an article in the New York Times at the time of her canonization was "Mother Teresa's Canonization Is a Recognition of Holiness, Not Perfection" where Kathleen Sprows Cummings stated, "Mother Teresa, despite her faults and even her sins, lived a life of extraordinary holiness and is worthy of veneration and imitation."

Just last week we celebrated the feast of St. Augustine, a great saint and theologian, but by his own words in his "Confessions" he told us clearly of many of his faults and sins. As we consider the many works of Mother Teresa, I think it is good to see all of her good works, and consider how this may challenge us to extend more charity and mercy to others in need. But we should also hear criticisms of her (as most of us also face), that she did have faults and sins (as most of us have), but was also criticized or ignored for good things she did that challenged others (which we may also face). Hopefully the lives of the saints, and of Mother Teresa, help us see how to live holy and faithful lives amidst the challenges and problems in our life and the world. St. Teresa pray for us.

ACADEMIC GROWTH TESTING AT ASSUMPTION


Children learn better—and faster—when teachers have a clear picture of what students know and how they are growing academically. Again this year, Assumption will be doing periodic testing of its students (K–8) to see individual growth in Math and Reading over the course of one year. The test is known as MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) by North West Association (NWEA), and it is NOT the same test that is given to public school students. Testing is held in August, January, and April, with individual reports being sent to parents after each testing. The Parent Report will show the strengths and weaknesses of each student. This data also provides teachers information to drive their instruction to best meet the needs of every student.

2023-2024 Assumption Theme




How it Works

MAP Growth is a computer—adaptive test. If a child answers a question correctly, the next question is more challenging. If they answer incorrectly, the next one is easier. This type of assessment challenges top performers without overwhelming students whose skills are below grade level. MAP Growth begins with a question at each student's grade level and adjusts the level of difficulty based on individual performance.



What it Measures

MAP Growth uses a RIT scale to accurately measure what students know, regardless of their grade level. It also measures growth over time, allowing you to track a child's progress throughout the school year and across multiple years. Once a child completes a MAP Growth test, they receive a RIT score. The RIT scale precisely measures student performance, regardless of whether they're performing on, above, or below grade level.



In math, as an example, a score on an August test for a student was 227 (70th percentile), but in January it changed to 240 (87th percentile). When the graph is created, it is obvious the growth of the student's knowledge and the data driven instruction which focused on improvement.

RIT scores have the same meaning across grade levels. If a fourth–grade student and an eighth–

grade student have the same RIT score in reading, then they are testing at the same level in that subject. This stable scale allows teachers to accurately measure each student's academic growth throughout the school year and over time.

Common Questions

How do schools and teachers use MAP Growth scores?

Teachers can use the scores to identify learning areas that their class should focus on, as well as monitor the growth of individual students. Principals use the scores to see the performance and progress of a grade level and the school.

Can MAP Growth tell me if my child is working at grade level?

Yes, BUT MAP Growth scores are just one data point that teachers use to determine how a student is performing.

What types of questions are on MAP Growth tests?

The MAP Growth tests include multiple choice, drag-and-drop, and other types of questions. Questions focus on critical thinking and the application of knowledge, not memorization.

RCIA/OCIA: THE RITE/ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

History of RCIA



In the Gospel of Matthew, we find the Great Commission. Christ sends forth of the Apostles as missionaries with the command "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 28:19; NASB).

Beginning with Our Lord's earliest command that "all nations" be initiated into His Church and throughout the history of that Church that followed, it is natural that many coming to faith and entering the Church would be adults. Very early in Church history, therefore, there were established processes of instructing and ministering to adults as they journeyed toward baptism and the other sacraments. The term "catechumen" is used today to mean exactly what it meant in biblical times when St. Paul writes to the Galatians regarding "the one who is taught the word (Greek: catechumens)" (Gal. 6:6; NASB). Church Fathers St. Justin Martyr (2nd century A.D), Tertullian (3rd century A.D.), St. Augustine (5th century A.D.), and many others reference periods of instruction and preparation for the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, the Holy Eucharist, and Confirmation) during the period known as the "catechumenate."

So, as the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) tells us: "From the time of the apostles, becoming a Christian has been accomplished by a journey and initiation in several stages. This journey can be covered rapidly or slowly, but certain essential elements will always have to be present: proclamation of the Word, acceptance of the Gospel entailing conversion, profession of faith, Baptism itself, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and admission to Eucharistic communion." (1)

The catechumenate was especially important and prominent in the early Church since, first, as previously mentioned, many (perhaps most) entered the Church for the first time as adults; and second, the early Church experienced several periods of severe persecution and it was critical that those entering the Church be well instructed in the faith for which they risked their lives. As time progressed, infant baptism became more common and the persecution of Christians was lifted, the catechumenate appears to have received a bit less dedicated attention and development. That is not to say that it disappeared—as a missionary faith, the Church has always had some method of providing instruction and preparation for the sacraments. However, the conscious and focused development of a universal approach to the catechumenate faded somewhat following the Middle Ages.

The CCC acknowledges that the catechumenate was reinvigorated and RCIA established much later when "the second Vatican Council restored for the Latin Church "the catechumenate for adults, comprising several distinct steps." The rites for these stages are to be found in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)." (2) This initiative of Vatican 2 has resulted in the RCIA programs, the pathways into the Church for adults seeking after Our Lord, that we have in our parishes today. "The Mystical Humanity of Christ Publishing"
