Hello,

This week we celebrate the **Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed on Thursday**, or more commonly referred to as **All Souls Day**. Hopefully we think of and pray for those we know who have died, this might include visiting someone's grave at a cemetery. One of the most common images I have of cemeteries is from my father. He would tell me and my siblings about when he was young how he had to ride the street car to the cemetery and would have a bushel of dirt with him to fill in over the grave where the earth would settle back down after the burial. It might have been for other relatives, but I always assumed it was for his father's grave who died when he was 17, and you needed to take care of the family grave sites.

That seems so foreign from our current practices, actually taking care of the plot yourself where your loved one is buried. Some people do still visit family graves regularly, but if it wasn't for perpetual care at cemeteries, I would believe that those well visited and cared for plots would stand out starkly against the majority which would look like condemned properties. Most of us don't visit cemeteries that much anymore, but that doesn't mean we can't remember and pray for the dead.

This practice isn't meant to be a morbid habit that we consider our lives cannot go on without them here with us, but it does help to keep our connection to them. Our prayers for them, for their swift passage to heaven, keeps an intimate connection and as with all of our relations, strengthens our memories of them. It is also a hope that they may be praying for us. Even if the Church has not recognized them as a saint and canonized them, they may already have begun an eternity in heaven with God. This practice also reminds us of our mortality, and hopefully also of our immortality, or what our ultimate end is meant to be.

Remembering that this life will end for us and we are truly meant for heaven will hopefully affect how we live today. It is so easy to get caught up in just what is happening today, or what I need now, or what message has gotten my attention this second. Hopefully we take the opportunity to remind ourselves of more important, eternal concerns to guide our lives.

One other thought. If you do manage to go and visit the grave of someone you know, look around at some of their neighbors and say a prayer for them also, someday we might meet them in heaven.

## ALL SAINTS DAY HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 1

Catechism of the Catholic Church says this about The Communion of Saints Paragraph 5. (Profession of Faith)

After confessing "the holy catholic Church," the Apostles' Creed adds "the communion of saints." In a certain sense this article is a



further explanation of the preceding: "What is the Church if not the assembly of all the saints?" The communion of saints is the Church. "Since all the faithful form one body, the good of each is communicated to the others... We must therefore believe that there exists a communion of goods in the Church. But the most important member is Christ, since he is the head... Therefore, the riches of Christ are communicated to all the members, through the sacraments." "As this Church is governed by one and the same Spirit, all the goods she has received necessarily become a common fund." The term "communion of saints" therefore has two closely linked meanings: communion in holy things (sancta)" and "among holy persons (sancti)."

Sancta sanctis! ("God's holy gifts for God's holy people") is proclaimed by the celebrant in most Eastern liturgies during the elevation of the holy Gifts before the distribution of communion. The faithful (sancti) are fed by Christ's holy body and blood (sancta) to grow in the communion of the Holy Spirit (koinonia) and to communicate it to the world.




## ALL SOULS DAY THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 2

All Soul's Day is a Roman Catholic day of remembrance for friends and loved ones who have passed away. All Saints' Day, together with All Souls' Day is known collectively as Hallow tide. All Souls' Day remembers all those who have died, not just the great and the good, but the ordinary person on the street.

At the 7pm Mass on November 2, we will bring forward our Book of Remembrance to honor your family and friends who have gone before us. As part of a conclusion, we will process to the cemetery after the closing prayer. As part of our procession this year, we will have luminaries to light our way.

## PRINCIPAL'S PEN



## All Saints Day began in 609 A.D. but not November 1!

I always find it fascinating to understand and know the history of our church and who was responsible for developing specific holy days on the church calendar. Catholic Online provided this information:

All Saints' Day is a solemn holy day of the Catholic Church celebrated annually on November 1. The day is dedicated to the saints of the Church, that is, all those who have attained heaven. It should not be

confused with All Souls' Day, is observed November 2, and is dedicated to those who have died and not yet reached heaven.

Although millions or even billions of people may already be saints, All Saints' Day observances tend to focus on known saints—that is those recognized in the canon of the saints by the Catholic Church. Generally, All Saints' Day is a Catholic Holy Day of

Obligation, meaning all Catholics are required to attend Mass on that day, unless they have an excellent excuse, such as serious illness. Other countries have different rules according to their national bishop's conferences. The bishops of each conference have the authority to amend the rules surrounding the obligation of the day.

Pope Boniface IV, who consecrated the Pantheon at Rome to the Virgin Mary and all the Martyrs on May 13 in 609 AD, formally started All Saints' Day. Boniface IV also established All Souls' Day, which follows All Saints. The choice of the day may have been intended to coopt the pagan holiday "Feast of the Lamures," a day which pagans used to placate the restless spirits of the dead. Pope Gregory III eventually established the holy day on November 1 in the mid-eighth century as a day dedicated to the saints and their relics. The May 13 celebration was subsequently abandoned. In Ireland, the Church celebrated All Saints' Day on April 20, to avoid associating the day with the traditional harvest festivals and pagan feasts associated with Samhain, celebrated at the same time. Following the establishment of the Frankish Empire, and following the reign of Charlemagne,



the holy day, which was already celebrated on November 1, became a holy day of obligation by decree of Pope Gregory IV and Louis the Pious, who was king over a portion of Charlemagne's former empire. Following the Protestant Reformation, many Protestants retained the holy day, although they dismissed the need to pray for the dead. Instead, the day has been used to commemorate those who have recently died, usually in the past year, and to remember the examples of those who lived holy lives.

The Catholic practice however, celebrates all those who have entered heaven, including saints who are recognized by the Church and those who are not. Holy day customs vary around the world. In the United States, the day before is Halloween and is usually celebrated

bу dressing in costumes with themes commonly associated



with death. Children go door-todoor in costume, trick-or-treating, that is soliciting candy from their neighbors. The holiday has lost much of its connection to its religious origins. Although nearly everyone celebrates Halloween for the fun of the secular holiday, the following religious solemnity is not widely practiced or acknowledged

by most Americans unless they are Catholic.

In other countries, such as Portugal, Spain and Mexico, traditional practices include performance of the play, "Don Juan Tenorio" and offerings made to the dead. All Saints' Day occurs on the same day as the Mexican "Dide los Innocentes" a day dedicated to deceased children. Across much of Europe, the day is commemorated with offerings

of flowers left on the graves of the dead. In Eastern Europe, candles are lit on graves instead of offerings of flowers. In some places, such as the Philippines, graves can be painted and repaired by family members. Many of these practices blur the distinction between All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

Thanks for reading about the history of All Saints. Next month, my article will be our Grade 1 students dressing as their saint of choice and their presentations during our Prayer Service!

### RCIA: THE RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

We have 12 inquirers and after our discernment process last weekend, all 12 will continue their journey with us towards Easter Sacraments. **God is good**. One of two very important Rites were celebrated at the 8am Sunday Mass. The rites are foundational in the formation of participants for in these liturgies they encounter Christ and are transformed by His grace. We saw evidence of initial conversion/intention to change; desire to enter into/grow a relationship with God in Christs evidence of the attirrings of reportance cell upon God in provi



relationship with God in Christ; evidence of the stirrings of repentance; call upon God in prayer; A sense of Church; experience of the company and spirit of Christians by contact with a priest and members of the Catholic Community.



After the rite this weekend, our inquirers will have new titles. Catechumens (one whom have never been baptized) and Candidates (one who was baptized in the Trinity of another faith.) With this Rite Catechumens publicly declare to the Church their desire to become member of Church and Candidates publicly declare to the Church their desire to seek full communion with Church. Our Church embraces them. We are finishing the inquiry stage and today, enter into the Catechumenate period.
