

Hello,

Saturday we celebrated the feast of one of the giants in the history of the Church, we call him a doctor of the Church, St. Thomas Aquinas. He seems a particularly appropriate saint to look at as we are beginning Catholic Schools week. He is especially known for his arguments which demonstrate that faith and reason are not opposed to each other, but rather, they support one another.

Thomas is referred to as not only a saint, but also one of the greatest minds of his time. As a theologian and a philosopher he helped bring Aristotelian philosophy back into the Western world and demonstrated how this use of reason could be used to support faith. While reason and philosophy were based on what we could determine from the natural world around us, faith had the added source of divine revelation that God had given us through the ages. Thomas stressed, if there was a truth from either area, faith or reason, then there must remain a truth in both, and that this could only help us to grow in our understanding of both.

An important and frequent manner in which Thomas is still referred to is his argument proving the existence of God through the use of reason. In his book, the Summa Theologica, Part 1, Question 2, Article 3, are his five proofs addressing the question "Whether God exists?" They can be summarized as follows:

Proofs of the existence of God

- **1. The Way of Motion:** Things move and change. Things are put into motion by something else. There cannot be an infinite regress, therefore there must have been an initial unmoved mover. This we call God.
- **2.** The Way of Causation: All things have an immediate or efficient cause. The efficient causes cannot go back infinitely, so there must be a first, uncaused cause. This we call God.
- **3.** The Way of Contingency: It is not necessary for any particular thing to exist, they are, rather, contingent things. All possible things at one point did not exist. If all things are merely contingent, then at one time things did not exist. There must be a necessary essence that caused all contingent things to be. This we call God.
- **4. The Way of Goodness:** Things have degrees of perfection—larger or smaller, heavier or lighter, warmer or colder. Degrees imply the existence of a maximum of perfection. This maximum perfection we call God.
- **5. The Way of Design:** Things in this world are ordered to particular ends. Even unintelligent things are predisposed to this and not that. This order inherent in even inanimate things necessitates an intelligence to direct it. This intelligence we call God.

In a country where the fastest growing demographic for religion is 'Nones' (those without any religious association) some of this might be handy to remember. Hopefully Thomas is still keeping us thinking, to help our faith, and to help us share that faith with others.





10 Reasons Why Catholic Education Still Matters

(Rev. Ron Nuzzi, Ph.D., A.C.E Program, Notre Dame University)

- 1. View of the World: Catholic School students learn that God is present and active in their lives and in the world. They learn to recognize the "footprints of God" in their daily experiences, especially in the midst of life's challenges. They see the signs of God's love around them, and become instruments of God's grace in their own neighborhoods, communities and the world.
- 2. **Life through Faith:** Within our faith, lies the answer to the mystery of all of life's successes and failures, and recognize we need help just like Jesus. Wins and losses on field, A's and F's in class, and laughter and tears in our lives are the way we participate in Jesus' dying and rising.
- 3. Value of Relationships: Catholic School students learn to experience God's grace and presence in their lives through relationships with family, friends and teachers. The loving and supportive relationships they experience are reflections of our faith community. As a community we celebrate our successes and achievements. We share grief and downfalls.
- 4. **Faith and Lived Experience:** Catholic school students are given the opportunity to explore the beauty and richness through the lens of faith and lived out in daily practice. They come to view the human person as created in God's image and likeness, and destined for eternal life. They learn to apply Scripture to their own lives as a tool for prayer and the true guide for virtuous living.
- 5. Civic Engagement: In recent research, it has been reported that private school graduates are significantly more likely to actively participate in civic activities than their public school counterparts. Catholic Schools were ranked #1 in the percentage of graduates who actively participate in civic and community activities such as voting, volunteering, letter-writing to legislators, and donations to charity.
- 6. **Service for the Common Good:** Catholic schools promote service as an essential component of their curriculum. Many Catholic schools have service programs from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Catholic school students learn that since community is at the heart of who we are, there are no strangers, only brothers and sisters in the Lord. We have a responsibility to respond to the needs of others because we are all part of God's family.
- 7. **Discipline as a Faith Expectation**: Catholic schools promote self-discipline that is based on the Gospel. Students are challenged to be Christ-like in word and action. They are asked to examine their choices and action in light of the Ten Commandments and the Gospel law of love.
- 8. **Education:** Catholic school students are exposed to the richness of education. Music, Art, Literature, Drama and Ritual are rooted in the rich history of the Church, and find their truest glory as an expression of divine praise. But in addition to that, the academic advantage students accrue in Catholic elementary schools is well documented.
- 9. **Catholic Identity:** Catholic education has always been at the heart of the Catholic mission. Catholic education, and the students who are the product of it, have been called the "greatest work of the Church". They have been entrusted with the fullness of faith and have been charged with the mission of evangelization.
- 10. **Personal Excellence:** Catholic school students learn that excellence is a response to God's blessings. Academic excellence is not a gospel value in and of itself. The Sermon on the Mount doesn't say "Blessed are you who get all A's." Education must have an altruistic orientation. Students learn so as to help others, and make a difference in the world around them.


A+ Students Volunteer at Assumption
