Hello,



The sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is going to be available for all of those in need next weekend at our 8am and 10am Sunday Masses. So who should be anointed? Some of us might remember when the sacrament was referred to as Extreme Unction (final anointing) and also have the understanding that it was only to be received when one was about to die. That is a proper time for it, when it might be a part of what is referred to as Last Rites when one's death is imminent and they receive the sacraments of Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, and the Eucharist in preparation for this death, but it is also appropriate other times.

The Rite for Anointing of the Sick states: "Those of the faithful whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age receive this sacrament." It also states: "The sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed and then again falls ill or during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious." If we limit the sacrament to only before an imminent death, then we are only looking at the spiritual benefits that Christ offers in the sacrament and denying the physical healing that may accompany it.

The Rite of Anointing takes place during Mass after the Gospel. This should be expected as that is when we are used to celebrating other sacraments when they are also a part of Mass. Most of us recognize that the exchange of vows and rings at a wedding comes after the Liturgy of the Word. If you have been to a Confirmation lately or a Baptism within Mass we recognize that this is also the time when those sacraments are celebrated, and similarly for the anointing of the sick.

In addition to particular prayers and petitions that are used for this sacrament, the two actions that are involved are the laying on of hands and the anointing itself. When there are only a few people the laying on of hands is done individually to each person, the priest laying his hands over them and silently praying for them. When we have many people, like our Sunday Masses, the priest will hold out his hands over the congregation and silently pray for them. After this those receiving the sacrament will either come forward as we do to receive the Eucharist, or if they cannot, they may be seated in the reserved front center pews where alternate pews will be kept empty so the priest can come to them for the anointing. They will be anointed on the head and the palms of their hands with the oil that Archbishop Carlson blessed for this purpose last year on Holy Thursday at the Chrism Mass.

This sacrament is a great gift that God gives us. A means by which the Holy Spirit comforts and aids us when we are in special need. A means God gives us to be open to and better live out His will throughout our lives.



This weekend at the 8:00 am Mass we will celebrate the "First of three Scrutinies". The Cycle A readings for the Scrutinies are rich in baptismal imagery therefore only for the Elect. Today was water, next week is light, and the following week is life.

We learn from Jesus' dialogue with the woman at the well three absolute truths about salvation:

- 1) Salvation comes only to those who recognize their desperate need for the spiritual life they do not have. Living water can be obtained only by those who recognize that they are spiritually thirsty.
- 2) Salvation comes only to those who confess and repent of their sin and desire forgiveness. Before this immoral woman could embrace the Savior, she had to concede the full burden of her sins.
- 3) Salvation comes only to those who take hold of Jesus as their Messiah. For the absolute truth is that salvation is found in no one else (John 14:6; Acts 4:12). (GotQuestions.org)



The scrutinies are among the most ancient prayers in the Christian liturgical tradition. As early as the second century, Christian communities would help those who had been chosen for Baptism to prepare for their initiation by laying on hands and by prayers for protection and deliverance from evil. Today we continue to celebrate these powerful rituals. We also understand today that our prayers for protection from evil are not limited to those engaged in the catechumenal process.

Prayer cards for the elect are available in the back of church. **Each person** should take a card. There are two types of cards, one for Catechumens (The Elect) who are preparing for Baptism and Candidates who were baptized in other faiths and are preparing for full communion with the Church through the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. Please remember to take one home and keep them in your prayers throughout the season of Lent.

Third Grade ROBO Cookies

Our all-girl 3rd grade team of 'robotics engineers', called the ROBO Cookies, presented their project "Boomtown Builds a Hospital" to their classmates. This team belongs to the Junior FIRST Lego League, where teams explore the growing needs and challenges of the people in the pretend community of Boomtown. The ROBO Cookies imagined and created a Hospital that solved a community problem and made life easier, happier, or more connected for the Boomtown people. Then, the team used LEGO® Education We Do 2.0 to design and program their HOSPITAL to have ER doors glide open when an ambulance arrived. An iPad Engineering Notebook was used to keep track of what they learned in designing, building and programming their build; they presented using a Show Me poster and used notes from their Engineering Notepad.

School Counselor and Faith, Family and Friends Program

Ms. Missy Neiswander (pronounced "nice-wander"), our school counselor, conducts lessons for students based on age and topics concerning them. The majority of the lessons come from the Faith, Family, Friends (FFF) curriculum. However, she does supplement with outside lessons, usually from DESE (Department of Elementary and Secondary Education). Ms. Neiswander sees K-5 classes once every other week, with 6-8 classes once a week.

S.T.E.M.

Throughout the week, Parent Volunteers come to our School Library to work with our students, grades PreK – 4. Upon arrival, the students are split into two groups – one group learning about the Library, selecting new books to read, or learning about the Dewey Decimal system, the other working on S.T.E.M. projects. S.T.E.M. is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. Students are posed with a question or situation and they must work to solve it using Math, Science, Engineering, and/or Math. Our Kindergarten students were given varying Math problems (such as 5+7). They had red cups and also wooden blocks – and their task was to build something that would represent the correct answer.

THE DIVINE MERCY CHAPLET

Divine Mercy - Way of the Cross

Friday, March 20 – 7:00pm in Church

The most important reason for reviving the practice of making the Stations of the Cross is that it is a powerful way to contemplate, and enter into, the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. It takes the reflection on the passion out of our heads, and makes it an imaginative exercise. It can involve our senses, our own experiences and our emotions... to the extent that - we come to experience the love of Jesus for us.



St. Faustina

This format is dedicated to the Way of the Cross and highlights the profound spiritual wisdom St. Faustina had of the truths of the Faith. Each Station has a relevant quote from the Diary for meditation upon while praying the Stations. Immediately following the Stations, we will pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet. During the Season of Lent, please join us either at 2:30pm in the Chapel or 7:00pm (except where noted in the bulletin).

March 15, 2020 — Third Sunday of Lent

EX 17:3-7; PS 95:1-2, 6-9; ROM 5:1-2, 5-8; JN 4:5-42 or JN 4:5-15, 19b-26, 39a, 40-42

Today's readings on this third Sunday of Lent present us with the theme of "thirst" and show us that a stewardship way of life can both satisfy our spiritual thirst for Christ and help us to satisfy Christ's thirst for souls.

Our first reading, from the book of Exodus, begins with the words, "*In their thirst for water, the people grumbled against Moses.*" What little faith and lack of trust they show after all God has done to free them from slavery. But Moses cried out to God for help, and sure enough God provided generously to satisfy thirst. He continues to provide generously for us these many centuries later.



Our Gospel passage from John recounts the life-changing encounter Christ has with the Samaritan woman at the well beginning with His words to her, "Give me a drink." Then, He adds, "*If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water.*"

Christ is speaking the very same words to us to us today. These two verses encapsulate the call to stewardship. Christ asks us to "give him a drink" by sharing what we have with Him and with others for His sake. Yet, it is Christ Himself who provides the water — the living water that is His grace.

God has chosen to include us in His plan for bringing all people to salvation through Him. We live out our part in His plan through a stewardship way of life. This Lent, let us resolve to respond to His call with passion and commitment. Let us do our part to quench His thirst.


