Hosannah



We now enter the most Holy Week of the year. Jesus enters Jerusalem fully aware of what is to happen to him. He is greeted with sweet "Hosannahs" and with cries of "Crucify Him!" The people lay palm branches in front of him as he rides on a colt; then they make him carry the branches of the Tree of Life, the cross on which he is glorified. Jesus knows they do not know what they are doing. When we see the story unfold we might wonder how people could so quickly turn from praise to condemnation, from kindness to cruelty.

We are invited to accompany Jesus on this journey, from triumphant entry into Jerusalem to triumphant death on the cross. As we go, let us see ourselves in the faces of the apostles, of the disciples, of Mary, of Pontius Pilate, of the Pharisees, of Judas, of the crowds singing "Hosannah to the King," of other crowds chanting "Crucify Him, Crucify Him," of the repentant thief. We have all made choices consistent with each character who encounters Jesus on the Way.

Jesus knows our hearts; he knows we are ready to accompany him, to love him, to be like Mary at his side, even like Peter who will also be crucified because of his faith in Jesus. And he knows that from time to time we forget, we become impatient, we lack trust in God's abundant grace. In this most holy week let us strive to be evermore like Mary; let us dismiss the fear of Pilate and the pride of the Pharisees. Let us choose only love, responding to God's love poured out in Christ on the cross. Let us prepare to enter fully into the mystery of Christ at Easter.

And let us pray all the more for our Elect and Candidates who will enter into full communion with us at the Easter Vigil. I encourage all of you to accompany them in this most holy week. Join in the Triduum Liturgy which begins with the Mass of the Lord's supper on Thursday evening, continues through the Veneration of the Cross on Friday evening and culminates in the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening. It is truly the most beautiful celebration in the life of the Church.

Palm Sunday - April 14, 2019... A walk with Jesus

We know the length of the first Palm Sunday procession: it's something like two miles from the Mount of Olives to the city of Jerusalem. But we really don't know the pace of that procession of Jesus, his disciples and the large crowd. Was it fast or slow? Solemn and stately, or rather disorganized? We can't get into a time machine and go back to find out. But wonder of wonders, the much shorter Palm Sunday procession in our parish will move at exactly the right pace, exactly the right pace for each of us:

If you are sick or suffering from a chronic illness, the pace will be just right for you. It will be the pace that Jesus sets, the pace of the one who bore all our ills and infirmities.

If you are elderly, the pace will be just right for you. It will be the pace that Jesus sets, the pace of the one who renews our spiritual youth through his powerful grace.

If you are young and would rather be running a marathon than walking in a sacred parade, the pace will be just right for you. It will be the pace that Jesus sets, the pace of the one who eagerly ran his race to win our salvation.

If you feel that you sometimes, or often, don't seem to know where you are headed, the pace will be just right for you. It will be the pace that Jesus sets, the one who leads us in our faith.



Follow the leader

The spiritual pace of our Palm Sunday procession through our church will be perfect for each of us as we enter into another Holy Week. On Palm Sunday, we follow Christ our Life where he leads us: to death to self. But Jesus never turned back: "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39).

Sometime, somewhere, in some circumstance, each follower of Jesus will need to say and mean these words, the words that mean death to self but life in Christ. This is God's paschal mystery, God's Easter plan for our salvation in the dying and rising of Jesus, in which we share through baptism.

Many people carried palm branches that first Palm Sunday; only Jesus carried the cross on Good Friday. But because he did, we find strength to follow his way of the cross through our self-sacrifice. Holy Week can be a great week for us if we enter more deeply into the dying and rising of Christ. The greatness of this week comes from what Christ has done for us in the past and does for us now. "We do not live in ungrateful forgetfulness," said St. Augustine, "but we celebrate in grateful memory." Our "grateful memory" sets us on our "closer walk" with Jesus on Palm Sunday and during Holy Week.

As we near the end of the period of Purification and Enlightenment:

We see the candidates developing a positive awareness of the baptism they have already received. The baptized candidates participate in the reflections on the Lenten Scriptures with the Elect and share in all the spiritual preparations for and reflections on the Scrutinies. The candidates are called to undertake with the whole Church the spiritual tasks of coming to a deeper awareness of both "the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every person longs to be delivered," and the mystery of Christ the Redeemer who fills the spirit of the believer with living water, light, and life (RCIA, 143).

Participation with the community of faith in the common Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving is also important for the candidates. The profound celebration of Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and a spiritual retreat for us. Please pray for us as we begin this final week of the journey to the Easter sacraments. The community, too, is reminded that this is a week of intense preparation to renew its own baptismal commitment. If you have not turned in your prayer cards, please do so today.

Please pray for a few select individuals who are unable to receive sacraments at this time. Their journey will continue to be prayerful and discerning.

Easter Triduum - Holiest days of the year!


Soon we will begin the holiest days of the year... the Easter Triduum. On *Holy Thursday*, we reenact the Lord's Last Supper, which He shared with His apostles on the night He was betrayed and arrested. This is one of the most beautiful liturgies of the entire

liturgical year. At the Mass, the priest will wash the feet of twelve men/women, just as Jesus did. Also on this night, priests all over the world will renew their sacred vows. This is because, at the Last Supper, Jesus not only instituted the Mass (Eucharist) but also the ministerial priesthood.

On *Good Friday*, the day of the crucifixion and death of our Lord, we have the veneration of the Cross. The Stations of the Cross is held at three o'clock in the afternoon (the hour He is believed to have died) and we will have a service later in the evening to venerate the cross. During the service we will have will have an opportunity to go forward and kiss the Cross in order to show honor and respect for Christ's sacrifice for our sake. There is no consecration of the Eucharist on this day, and the Communion we receive will be from the night before, which has been reserved in the tabernacle.

Holy Saturday is a vigil. We keep watch for the expectant rising of Our Savior. This was the day He went down into the netherworld in order to bring back up with Him into heaven those who had died before His coming. Up to this time, the gates to heaven were closed and no one could go there because of the original sin of Adam. Jesus changed all that. By paying the price for our sins on the Cross, He gained for us our eternal salvation, and heaven was opened once more. Also on this night, persons who have spent months of preparation will be received through Baptism and Confirmation into the Catholic Church for the first time. It is a joyous occasion.

Those who engage themselves wholeheartedly in living the entire paschal cycle (Lent, Triduum and Easter's Fifty Days) discover that it can change them forever. This is especially so of the Triduum which, standing at the heart of the Easter season, is an intense immersion in the fundamental mystery of what it is to be Christian. During these days, we suffer with Christ so that we might rise with Him at His glorious Resurrection. Holy Week is a time to clear our schedules of unnecessary activities. Our minds and hearts should be fixed on Jesus and what He did for us. Let us bear the Cross so that may be worthy of wearing the crown He wore.



April 14, 2019 — Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Lk 6:17, 20-26 IS 50:4-7; PS 22:8-9, 17-20, 23-34; PHIL 2:6-11; LK 22:14-23:56 or LK 23:1-49

Two very different responses to our Lord's passion are highlighted during the Gospel reading from Luke today: the response of Simon of Cyrene and the response of Jesus' acquaintances. Of Simon we are told, "They took hold of a certain Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country; and after laying the cross on him, they made him carry it behind Jesus." Whether Simon entered willingly and compassionately into this service or whether he took up the Cross of Christ with a grudge, we don't know. What we do know is this: Simon did his part faithfully. He stayed near to Christ, carrying the Cross until our Lord reached Golgotha, the site of His crucifixion. We also know that Simon's family were among the first of the early Christians. Staying near to Christ, embracing the Cross (quite literally), transformed his life and the life of his family.

In contrast, near the end of this Gospel account we are told of another reaction to Jesus' passion and death, namely that "all His acquaintances stood at a distance." They knew Jesus! They had heard him preaching and teaching, witnessed His signs and miracles, maybe even benefited personally from them. Perhaps they did not participate in mocking Him or calling for His crucifixion. But they chose to stay a safe distance from Him when the going got tough. Unlike Simon, they refused to go too near to Christ.

Where will you place yourself this week? Keeping your distance from all the pain and suffering Christ endured? Or close by, staying near to Him like Simon did? It is when we go near to Christ that we can be transformed by Him. It is by embracing the crosses in our lives, stewarding them well rather than trying to run from them that we become His true disciples.


