Hello,

Tomorrow is the feast of Saints Peter and Paul. We are so used to saying those names together that we don't often think about how different the two were and how strange it is to pair them together.

Peter, a fisherman who was called by Jesus and would be the leader of the Apostles. He would always ask the questions for all of them, and also be the one that Jesus would address as the rock and foundation of the Church. Even after the Ascension he would continue to be considered the leader of the Apostles and travel spreading Christ's word, and the faith up to his death in Rome.

Paul, on the other hand, was an educated man and a Pharisee. First noted in Scripture for his persecution of Christians. Jesus then appears to him about a year after his crucifixion and Paul is converted. He would travel even wider than Peter in spreading the Gospel and leave us the priceless letters that he would send to different Christian communities as he not only encouraged, corrected, and instructed them in their faith but as they manage to continue to do so for us today.

The primary interactions we hear of between the two are arguments. As they and the other apostles are bringing the Gospel to many different people, they would disagree about what Jewish practices must be preserved and which local customs could be incorporated into the practice of their faith. Not the easiest topics to be addressed, but we are grateful that they did start addressing them so early in our history so that they were able to settle some possible sources of division then and as a model and encouragement that we can resolve and discern differences we continue to face even today. Paul's writings clearly do not shy away from this topic as he described how we are each blessed with different gifts by the Holy Spirit, that together we are united as the body of Christ.

Peter and Paul have been celebrated together from the early years of the Church. It was a common belief that they shared the same feast day because they died on the same day, but now it is more commonly believed that they were thought to have died on the same date because they shared the same feast day. Whichever it may be, we are truly blessed to have had these two saints help to spread the Gospel and lead the Church faithfully at it's beginning, to keep us united to Christ, and open and inviting of all others.

As we continue to adjust to new circumstances in our lives, God reminds us that even in the most impossible of situations God's promise remains. In the first reading a woman of influence, who has no children and is growing older, is promised a son by the prophet Elisha in response to her kindness and hospitality. Simple gifts that give birth to great joy. Often in times of hardship and loss, our hearts become more open to God's grace, creating a stronger awareness of our dependence on His loving concern.

St. Paul makes clear that we will pass through death with Christ to a newness of life. We have died with Christ in baptism, and we live with him. He puts it simply: think of it as being *dead to sin, living for God*. St. Matthew illuminates this perspective with the message that even a simple cup of cold water for a child is a gesture that will not be forgotten, in fact, will be greatly rewarded.

The Living Word of God...

Do you want to experience the love, joy, and peace that comes from living a God-centered life? Are you trying to figure out what God is calling you to do with your life? If so, read the Bible, every day. All the teachings on being a good steward of our gifts come directly from the Gospels, the Old Testament, and the letters of the New Testament.

Stewardship is not a new fad invented by the Church or a word just used by environmentalists. Stewardship is the way God has intended for all of us to live since the beginning of time. The Bible has always been the playbook for living a grateful and generous lifestyle. The world is filled with many self-improvement books. Fortunately, as Christians, we have the best-selling "self-improvement" book of all-time, the Bible. (Current estimate is five billion sold and counting).

Here is the best part about reading the Bible, not only do you learn about God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, but you actually grow in love *and* friendship with the Holy Trinity. The Bible is the living Word of God that speaks to each of us directly in our current circumstances.

Talk to daily Bible readers about their experiences, and they will frequently say that what they read in the Bible pertained to exactly what was going on in their lives at that moment. This is not a coincidence. God loves us and knows what we need when we need it.

In any good, loving relationship, it takes two committed parties. God's commitment is well known: He created us, He gave us an abundance of gifts, He gave us His only Son for our redemption, and He sent the Holy Spirit to guide us today. What about our commitment? All God asks is that we invite Him into our hearts and clear a little space for Him to operate in our lives.

A good, loving relationship also requires balance - the appropriate amount of time spent on the appropriate things. During this time of pandemic, social injustice, and civil unrest, it is not good to fill up on all the bad news fed to us around the clock. It is also not good to kill time by binge watching your favorite shows or reading gossip on social media. If you want to live a virtuous life in a close relationship with our Lord, then balance your day by reading the Bible. What we put in our minds and hearts affects our thoughts and our actions. If you want good outputs, you need good inputs. If we want a good loving relationship with our Lord and with each other, then start with the daily reading of God's Living Word.

Faith is personal, but it is not meant to be private - we are all part of the Body of Christ. If you are unsure or uncomfortable with how to start reading the Bible, ask a family member or friend who is a daily Scripture reader for help. Or join a small Bible study group or start one yourself. All we need to do is take the first step.

Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time June 28, 2020

2 KGS 4:8-11, 14-16A; PS 89:2-3, 16-19; ROM 6:3-4, 8-11; MT 10:37-42

Today's readings take us back to some basics of stewardship living and demonstrate the genius of this way of life.

Our First Reading, from 2 Kings, shows us the necessity and power of hospitality. It recounts the story of a woman who showed loving hospitality to a visitor, inviting him to dinner with her family and arranging a room for him in their home so that he would have a comfortable place to stay during his travels through her town. She reached out to the man in a simple and practical manner to make him feel welcome and was rewarded in an extraordinary way.

In our Second Reading, from the Letter to the Romans, St. Paul reminds us of the power of our Baptism and how this sacrament makes us disciples. What does that mean for us here and now? St. Paul tells us very clearly: *"You must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus."* We must live for Christ! Nothing less will do.

Our Lord proclaims this same instruction in a rather shocking way in our Gospel passage from Matthew: *"Whoever finds his life [by living for oneself] will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it."* But how do we lose our life? Precisely through loving actions towards others, loving them as if they were Christ. *"Whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple... he will surely not lose his reward."*

The simple brilliance of stewardship living? Only our infinitely creative, compassionate God could conceive it!

PREVENT AND PROTECT UPDATE:

To all those who work or volunteer here at Assumption Parish, involving our CHILDREN, the VULNERABLE or the ELDERLY, you must be registered into the new Prevent and Protect site in order to be in Compliance with the Archdiocese. This is **MANDATORY**. You can go to our website; www.assumptionbvm.org, go to Quick Links, scroll down to the Safe Environment link, this link will take you to my link where you will find directions on how to register.

If you have started this registration but have NOT received your **CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION**, that means you are not in Compliance with the Archdiocese, so please go back into your P/P account and double check your requirement checklist to see what needs to be completed and submitted.

IF YOU HAVE NOT TAKEN A PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN WORKSHOP, we are now offering ZOOM Sessions. After you have completed your registration into the P&P site, and have not already taken a PGC workshop, it will take you to the schedule, *there are no live sessions*...scroll down to Zoom Sessions where you can pick a session ~ click to register.

Then, 24 hours before the class the facilitator will send them an email with the passcode and id meeting info. The day of the session, log in with that code about 10 minutes before the session is to start. The facilitator will take attendance and then they will give them credit the next day.

Parish Business Manager Wanted – After the sudden death of our previous business manager, Jim Hager, we are now looking for someone to fill this full-time position. This position is an administrator who supports the Pastor in his responsibilities to the parish as a steward of the physical, financial and personnel resources of the parish. Corporate Grants and Matching Gifts

Many parishes and schools are aware that recently corporations (Boeing, Mastercard, Amazon, Pfizer, etc) are tightening the restrictions for corporate grants and matching gifts for religious organizations. Parishes are now receiving emails from corporations asking for an independent 501(c)3 for the school as they are no longer accepting our 501(c)3 because the EIN provided is for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and religious organizations are ineligible for the corporations' platforms.

Tom Buckley, Archdiocesan General Counsel, has responded to this situation as follows:

"Unfortunately, if this is their (the corporation's) position, it means you will be ineligible for future donations from them unless and until they change their mind. Our schools are not separately incorporated. They are parish run. But even if they were separately incorporated they would have to be set up under canon law as a religious non-profit, so that would not help us here either.

More and more publicly traded companies are adopting these policies.

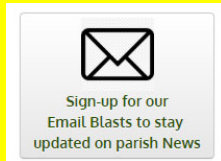

Blessing Religious Articles

Many Catholics like to use religious articles. Medals, crucifixes, statues, pictures, scapulars, rosaries, and other items made from common

elements may be set aside for religious use. They are usually obtained from dealers of church goods, but they may also be fashioned at home by hand. Some religious articles are hung on the wall at home, at school, or at work. Others are worn beneath or on top of clothing. It is customary for a deacon or a priest to bless such articles. Religious articles can be a means of evangelization. They depict a symbol of the faith that Catholics hold. They prompt discussion about biblical figures and events, as well as the holy people who have kept the faith throughout history. Many Catholics carry religious articles with them as a reminder of God's presence or to seek divine protection. A blessing sets the articles apart for this sacred purpose. The blessing of religious articles may take place during liturgical prayer. People bring articles with them to church, where the celebrant introduces the service. A Scripture reading is proclaimed. For example, in Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians, he says. *"All of us, gazing with unveiled face on the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, as from the Lord who is the Spirit"* (see 3:17b-4:2). Intercessions are made, and the celebrant concludes with a blessing over the objects and the people. Alternatively, the priest or deacon may say a very short formula apart from a liturgical service *"May this (name of article) and the one who uses it be blessed, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit"* (Book of Blessings, 1462).
