

Hello,

Yesterday was the holy day of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our parish feast day. You might have noticed that I said 'holy day' and not 'holy day of obligation'.

While the feast of the Assumption is usually a holy day of obligation it was not this year because it fell on a Saturday. I consider there are two appropriate questions to ask about this that I will try to answer: When is it a holy day of obligation and when isn't it? And Why is it sometimes and not others?

The holy days of obligation are every Sunday and also the following: The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ (Christmas), the Epiphany, the Ascension, and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, Holy Mary Mother of God (New Year's Day), her Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8th) and her Assumption (Aug. 15th), Saint Joseph (March 19th), Saints Peter and Paul (June 29th) and All Saints (Nov. 1st). This is the universal law, but the conference of bishops for each country can remove the requirement of some of the holy days and can transfer others to Sundays. The obligation for the holy days of St. Joseph and Saints Peter and Paul were removed. The holy days of Epiphany, the Ascension (in most areas of the United States) and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ have been transferred to Sundays. Christmas is of course always a holy day of obligation as is the Immaculate Conception in the United States. But whenever the solemnities of Mary Mother of God, the Assumption, or All Saints Day falls on a Saturday or on a Monday in the United States they are not a day of obligation.

Now the more important question, Why? First ask why have holy days of obligation? To give glory to God, to recognize the importance of these events and these saints, to keep the priorities in our lives that we need to be reminded of. So why would we relax any of these requirements? Because we can start getting overly focused on just meeting requirements, and they can become overly burdensome, and we know Jesus had a few words about making laws overly burdensome on the people. When anticipatory or vigil Masses the evening before were first approved in recognition of the challenge for some to fulfill their Mass obligation on the day itself this can be seen as a bit of an extension of that relaxation of the requirement: but now that day is going into the previous day, and thus the conflicts between Saturday and Sunday or Sunday and Monday. If someone couldn't meet their obligation on the one day, what about if the two days are now in a row? And in some places the realization is that there are not enough priests to celebrate the Masses for those two days in a row if the vigil Masses would already be overlapping.

This year we also have had the dispensation from our normal Sunday Mass obligation due to the COVID-19 virus. The archbishop has relaxed this law out of concern for the health and safety of our entire community. Similarly for Sunday's, as for the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, even without the obligation we hopefully continue to take the time to give glory to God, to recognize the significance of this feast day and Mary in our lives, and strive to stay united to God and His Church in whatever ways are appropriate. Sometimes when something isn't an obligation we can do even better than if we were required to do something.

August 16, 2020 – Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

IS 56:1, 6-7; PS 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8; ROM 11:13-15, 29-32; MT 15:21-2833

Our Gospel today, from Matthew, reminds us to trust in Him even when it seems He is not answering our prayers.

God wants to lead us to the joy of heaven to spend eternity with Him. For that, we must be strong in faith and live our lives as an act of love

and gratitude to Him. In other words, we must allow Him to transform us into saints. This is what the stewardship way of life is meant to do. Sometimes, that will feel painful to us. Often, it will be challenging.

Jesus certainly challenged the Canaanite woman in today's Gospel passage from Matthew. She called out to Him on behalf of her daughter, who was being tormented by a demon. What did Jesus do in reply to this mother's desperate plea? Nothing. He "did not say a word in answer to her." Undeterred, the woman continues to call out to Him, yet He still does not give her what she asks for. Instead, He continues to challenge her faith.

And she rises to the challenge to such an impressive degree that Jesus exclaims, "O woman [a term of deep respect in that day], great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." Imagine hearing those words proclaimed over us by God. Truly there could be no higher honor than hearing our Lord say that to us.

So we must accept the difficulties that come with the stewardship way of life. Some days will be a true challenge to our trust in God. But those are the days when God is making saints of us.

Let's embrace the hard days during these difficult times. The deep joy that eventually comes, the eternal reward He promises, will be so worth it.

From the Principal's Pen

We are thrilled to be back in school and have selected our annual theme:



This year, we begin with 10% of our school population live-streaming their classes at home. This means that these students come to their computer, with uniforms on at

7:45 AM, turn on their computer and become part of the class. The teacher and student see one another and can speak to one another. The student participates in class, does work that is assigned and ends their day at 3:10pm, just as other students.

Because of the CARES ACT — ESSER FUNDS, we were allotted \$22,000 to provide equipment needed to allow for distance learning. We purchased 21 complete carts that will be used in classrooms for the real-time live-streaming.

Safety during COVID

Assumption is following recommendations of the St. Charles Health Department, the American Association of Pediatricians, and the Archdiocese of St. Louis to provide a safe environment for those children who will come to school for learning. Changes have been made in professional cleaning processes and local cleaning, mask wearing, hallway passage, cafeteria service at lunch, and recess locations. A safety plan has been provided to all faculty and parents.

2nd Grade Teacher, Mona Mudd Nominated for Pulitzer

Congratulations to Mona Mudd, 2^{nd} Grade teacher at Assumption, has been accepted as a nominee for a Pulitzer Prize for her recent book, <u>Slack Water</u>. The final decision will be made in April, 2021 by the Pulitzer Foundation.

SINCERITY IN PRAYER. HUMILITY IN FAITH

Isaiah 56:1, 6-7 - Romans 11:13-15, 29-32 - Matthew 15:21-28

Matthew

25:40

This Sunday we see a woman whose plight has been ongoing, and she seems to be at her wit's end with no answers on the horizon. She clearly loves her sick daughter, so this mother — a Canaanite who is not a part of the chosen people of Israel — attempts the unthinkable because she's run out of options. She humiliates herself with her desperate plea. Jesus himself seems not to respond at first, and the disciples consider her a nuisance and want her to leave so they can be about the rest of their day. Instead of becoming angry and stomping away or becoming bitter at the lack of assistance, she worships Jesus, despite what this would surely do to her reputation. This catches his attention, and a quick dialogue ensues. She knows the inherent tension between the Canaanites and the Israelites, but this does not deter her from seeking help from the only option left. In the end, her prayer is answered according to her desire.

What a model of faith!!! So many of us are accustomed to prayers; we learned them when we were young. But our familiarity with prayers isn't always accompanied by a sincerity in our prayer. We rattle off words while our minds are onto the next task on our day's agenda. Our bodies are present, but our hearts haven't yet left the last moment of pleasure, concern, or anxiety. Our prayer life is fragmented because our need for help has been disconnected from our belief in Jesus' mission to save. Certainly, there are life circumstances that are graver than others that bring us to our knees faster; but that doesn't mean that kneeling in prayer — literally and metaphorically — is limited to the grave and dire situations. St. John Chrysostom remarks on the "earnestness of her prayer," and this catches the attention of Jesus in a new way. Jesus admires the tenacity of her faith, and then the miracle of her daughter's healing happens. As we review the flow of the text, this mother does not outright ask Jesus to heal her daughter, as it happens in other healing stories of the Gospels. This mother confesses her need for help with a situation beyond her control. And Jesus recognizes the confidence of her humility, and rewards that with the healing of her daughter. The mother brings all of herself to Jesus, and in her great faith, she sees that the powers of heaven are on her side.

How do we learn, then, to be more present each time we pray?

Listen to yourself breathing. So often, we rush into our times of prayer without properly disposing ourselves for a spiritual encounter. The Rosary and Lectio Divina are, for example, powerful tools for penetrating deeper in the mysteries of God, but without a stilled soul, our efforts lack a key ingredient. Taking a few minutes to quiet ourselves — externally and internally — can be a tremendous aid in deepening our prayer life.

Talk less. Listen more. We live in uncertain times. No doubt. There's an anxiety and hostility in the very air we breathe. There's much to complain or at least converse about. We look for answers to the very complicated situations we face. Yet the only answer is Jesus; the only path is towards the Cross and Resurrection. As we learn to listen to ourselves breathing, hopefully, one of the things that will happen is that we learn to listen to that still, small voice hidden in the deepest corner of our hearts. That small voice is so often crowded out by the mechanics of our prayer time and by the constant barrage of distractions in our interior world. If we can become silent, then God's booming voice can be heard.

Live in faith. Sometimes, we forget that we've already read the last chapter in the 'book of life!' We know that, in the end, Jesus wins! We know that Jesus has already shared his winnings with us because of our Baptism. Yet we approach Jesus in prayer with nonchalantness (If you wanted to do this ...), doubt (I don't know if you can do this, but ...) or sometimes over-meekness (I'll accept whatever you want ...). While there is merit to each of these attitudes, this Canaanite mother gives us an example of the humble boldness of her faith in confessing her

need for mercy. She knows she's coming to the Lion of Judah, not — if you'll allow me to be cheeky — to the mouse of Nazareth!

Our prayer life is not rooted in our own strength or resources to find answers to remedies to the complexities of life; rather, it ought to be rooted in Jesus and the Holy Spirit. Each situation we find ourselves in can be seen — with eyes of faith — as opportunities to practice the kind of faith exemplified in the mother of today's Gospel. The prayer of this mother came from her heart to the heart of the only one left for her to ask. It's as if the depths of her heart was speaking to depths of Jesus' heart. Jesus always responds to the prayers that come from the depths of our hearts rather than the multiplicity or eloquence of our words! Would that our prayer life be more like that! $\sim Br$.
