Hello,

One of the interesting things about Labor Day is that most years I will hear at least one person voice the observation that it is kind of strange that on the day we celebrate labor, most people have off of work. It is also kind of strange that you could say that the celebration of Labor Day has led to the decrease in the amount of labor we do, reducing the number of hours in the standard work day to 8, and the number of days in the standard work week to 5. Not to mention also restricting work of young children.

A main reason why this seems strange is that in some ways the holiday shouldn't be called Labor Day, but maybe Laborer Day. The intent is to recognize the value not just of the labor, but of the person who labors. In doing so they are not just providing a product, but they are using the gifts they have to support themselves, their families, and for the good of society as a whole.

Unfortunately this year we have seen what have been described as higher unemployment rates than even in the Great Depression. Due to restrictions and limitations that have occurred due to COVID-19 many jobs have been suspended with the chance that some will have to wait until the fear of spreading the virus is under control and others, especially if the company they worked for may have closed, will never have the same job again. This situation gives us another perspective on Labor Day as a deeper appreciation for the ability to work, and encouragement to do what we can to provide that opportunity to others.

As we celebrate Labor Day I can't help but also think of the patron saint of workers, St. Joseph. The following is the opening prayer for the feast of St. Joseph the worker, an appropriate prayer for us this weekend:

O God, Creator of all things, who laid down for the human race the law of work, graciously grant that by the example of Saint Joseph and under his patronage we may complete the works you set us to do and attain the rewards you promise. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A Word on Anointing of the Sick

Often times we receive calls asking for the Anointing of the Sick only to have the person pass away before the priests are able to get to them. While we do our best to be available, we are not always able to respond at a moment's notice. Especially with current restrictions for visiting hospitals and nursing homes, it may take us longer than usual to be approved to visit. If a loved one is suffering from a serious illness or old age, do not wait to ask for the Anointing of the Sick. A person does not have to be imminently dying to receive the sacrament. It is better for them to receive the grace of the sacrament earlier, rather than delaying grace.

DUE TO COVID-19, our Life Nights look different than they normally would as our highest priority is the holiness and health of our teens. *Here are the measures we are taking:*

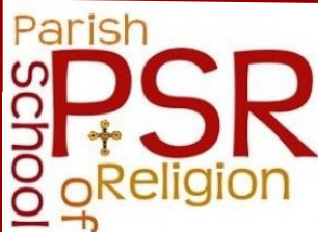

From the Principal's Pen

Learning through experience is such an amazing sight to behold. Today, I went to the gym and watched a first grade class learn about balance, hand-eye coordination, and movement to increase heart rate. Ms. Carter taught her students the concepts while they sat on the "line" and listened, then the class was divided into four (4) "teams". Each team practiced a specific skill at their station, then moved to the next station – new skill.

5th Graders Build Atoms -Using the Periodic Chart of Elements might be something you remember from High School, but our new Science Program uses NGSS (Next Generation Science Standards) for teaching students the most current information for the 21st century. The learning is spiral and blended, meaning that the standards for earth science, biology, chemistry, and physics concepts are taught over the course of a year. Students learn concepts and then apply them in practice. Applying their knowledge of elements from the Periodic Table, our 5th graders took toothpicks and colorful mini-marshmallows to create the element assigned to them. Pictured, is the instruction paper along with our students working to create ZINC.

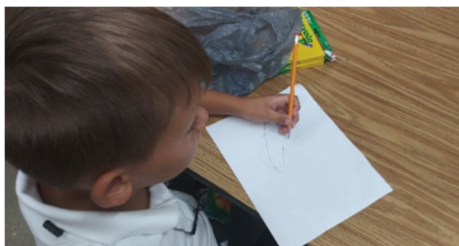
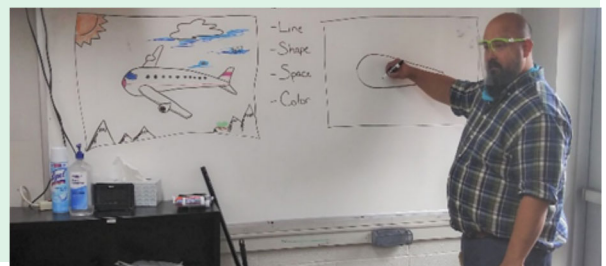

The Elements of Art - As Mr. Gonzalez explained to his 1st grade class, "The elements of art include line, value, texture, shape, form, color and space. Twenty-third Sunday of Ordinary Time

EZ 33: 7-9; PS 95: 1-2, 6-9; ROM 13: 8-10; MT 18: 15-20

St. Paul echoes Christ in many ways. In the 13th Chapter from his letter to the Romans, he continues with his thoughts on how we should live to please God, and he uses a sentence which Christ often repeated. After listing several of the 10 Commandments, Paul states, "...whatever other commandments there may be, are summed

up in this saying, namely, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'."

There is always much that gets debated in that admonition, such as loving yourself, and who exactly is your neighbor? Paul's point, like that of Jesus, is simply that we are called to treat others as we may like to be treated. We need to show them the respect and caring that we may hope for and wish for. God loves us, and if we realize that, we may ultimately come to the conclusion that we are loveable.

Most of us know someone whose love is evident by how they treat others and how they live. Loving neighbor is a visible expression of everything that Jesus taught. It is a way of expressing the depth of our faith and our belief that we are Disciples of Christ.

St. Francis de Sales captured all about what this love is and who is your neighbor when he wrote, "Examine your heart often to see if it is such toward your neighbor as you would like his or hers to be toward you in his or her place. This is the touchstone of true reason." It is relatively basic and simple — our neighbor is everyone with whom we have contact and love is what makes it all work.

150 ANNIVERSARY



OF ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY PARISH

Beginning this weekend, you will read the history of our parish starting from the very beginning leading up to where we are now! You might even recognize some of our long time parishioners! It is amazing how our parish has evolved over the years. It is a beautiful story of how the Holy Spirit has been at work... and even continues His work to this very day. And so....

A handful of families met in the fall of 1869 to discuss the organization of a new parish in O'Fallon, Missouri. By the end of the meeting families pledged \$2,500, and an anonymous St. Louisan donated 165,000 bricks. Judge Arnold Krekel gave four acres of land. Mr. Henry Kister of St. Charles was hired to construct the first church for \$6,500, with the stipulation that the parishioners would supply the stone for the foundation, brick for the building, in addition to the sand and lime. The new church was named "Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary."

The church was ready for occupancy in the spring of 1871. Assumption's first pastor, Father William Sonnenschein, arrived just three days before the church's dedication which was held on Sept. 17, 1871. From an article from the St. Charles News dated September 21, 1871 it stated:

"We learn that nearly three thousand people were present at the dedication of the Catholic Church last Sunday (Sept. 17, 1871). A train of twenty cars came up from St. Louis, loaded with people, and a large train well filled also went from St. Charles. An excellent dinner was served on the grounds, and the band employed for the occasion enlivened the day with their inspiring strains of music. The net receipts, which go to the church, amounted to nearly \$2,000. It is spoken as one of the most imposing scenes ever witnessed in this county."

Soon after the dedication, the parish bought a house and an acre of land near the church for \$1,600 for a priest's residence. They also purchased pews for \$300 and later in the summer of 1872 procured a small church bell to be installed in the church tower to call the people of Assumption Parish to worship.
