A few major decisions have been made regarding events at our parish that we will or will not be having this year in light of COVID-19 restrictions:

Fall Festival - Last week we published in the bulletin the notice that we would not be having our annual Fall Festival this October. The reason for this was a combination of concerns involving the risk of spreading the virus amongst both patrons and volunteers.

CYC Sports – The Archdiocese of St. Louis has decided to go forward with their soccer and volleyball youth programs for this Fall. Numerous precautions are being made regarding participants in the sports as well as coaches and spectators to minimize the risk of spreading the virus. Our school guidelines and requirements will be used as a minimum with other additional practices for the specific activities. The CYC website has additional details:

Parish Meetings – We are opening up our facilities to start having some meetings while maintaining safe practices. Our school has been open for a month without any identified cases of COVID-19 in the building yet. With CYC sports starting it seemed an appropriate time to also start offering our facilities for some other activities. Similar guidelines and requirements for those attending the meetings and sanitizing of the meeting space will be required as are practiced in our school. Contact the parish office if you desire to reserve a meeting space.

Mass on the Grass – Saturday, Oct. 3rd the 5:00pm Mass will be held on our upper soccer field (weather permitting). Bring a lawn chair and space yourselves out. Since many other regular social activities are not possible at this time this will hopefully be a means to help build our community as we gather on a beautiful Fall evening (we are praying) to celebrate Mass. Assuming the weather cooperates with our outdoor Mass, Mass will not be celebrated in the church building at that time.

As all of you know, we are having to adapt as conditions and regulations change. Restrictions will continue to change as the spread of the virus increases or decreases and our knowledge of how it spreads improves. Thank you all for cooperating and understanding the different practices we have had to do to reduce the risks to all of us out of concern for each other's health and safety.

Catechetical Sunday September 20, 2020

This weekend the Church celebrates Catechetical Sunday - September 20, 2020, under the theme of "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you." Today, catechists are formally commissioned for ministry to the community.

Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that *each* baptized person plays in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. Catechetical Sunday is an opportunity for all to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith.

What Does the Word "Catechetical" Mean?

The word might be more familiar than you think. Many Catholics have used the word "catechism" for years, and they know it has something to do with the compendium of the Church's teachings. The root word, "catechesis," is from a Greek word meaning "to echo, or resound." Catechesis is the act of resounding or bringing the Church's teachings to the world. A catechist is one who teaches in the name of the Church.

Why do we have a special day set aside to commission catechists?

Catechesis is a distinct and special ministry in the Church. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church makes clear, "Catechesis is intimately bound up with the whole of the Church's life . . . her inner growth and correspondence with God's plan depend essentially on catechesis" (no. 7). This ministry of teaching in the name of the Church has a profound dignity, which is why catechists are formally commissioned by the Church. It is only fitting that we set aside a day to highlight this ministry and invite the entire church community to think about our responsibility to share our faith with others.

How are parents, the primary catechists of their children, recognized on Catechetical Sunday?

Parents are truly the primary catechists of their children. They prepare the soil and plant the first seeds of faith. On Catechetical Sunday, we not only highlight the work of catechists in parishes and schools, but we also commend parents and guardians and encourage them to take seriously their role of making their Catholic households a place where faith is passed on to the next generation. This is why the rite of blessing of catechists used on Catechetical Sunday includes an optional blessing of parents and guardians. ~United States Catholic Bishops


Wednesday, September 23rd ~ Life Teen Headquarters Grand Opening!

From the Principal's Pen

8th Graders attend Patriot Day Ceremony

We were honored that our 8th graders were asked to participate in the Patriot's Day Ceremony at O'Fallon's City Hall on September 11, 2020. The ceremony was held at the location where salvaged steel is on display from the New York City's World Trade Center, which was destroyed on 9-11-2001.



When our 8th graders arrived, they were asked to distribute long-stemmed white and red carnations to all visitors to the ceremony. You'll notice that our students were out of out of uniform because it was "picture day" at school.





The event was dedicated to first responders, police, firefighters and paramedics who stepped forward to rescue victims of the attacks in 2001, and the victims and families. The ceremony included O'Fallon Mayor

Bill Hennessy and O'Fallon Police Chief Tim Clothier, a moment of silence, a rifle salute and the placing of the wreath by the Police, Fire and Ambulance District Honor Guard. At the end of the ceremony, our students and other visitors were asked to place flowers at the memorial, where the wreath was laid. Our 8th graders commented that it was a solemn occasion with a message of working together for peace.



Safety at Assumption

Each year, Assumption has a Fire drill each month, two (2) Tornado and (2) Earthquake drills per year, and one Intruder drill per year. For safety, all classrooms and offices have signage on exiting the building in varying circumstances. In addition, our teachers are annually shown Archdiocesan created videos on Fire, Earthquake, and Tornado drills. We began our first Fire and Earthquake drills, on Friday, September 18th. In classrooms, students watched the student version of the Earthquake video, then had the drill where we "Drop, Cover, and Hold On" then EXIT the building. Following this, teachers discussed situations that could occur

when attempting to exit the building, such as halls may be blocked. The key to exiting the building, was to look for a safe route.

Our first Fire drill was inside, because we currently cannot have large numbers of people in the hallway at one time. So, prior to the drill, teachers walked their class to their assigned "outdoor" safety location, so students knew where to gather in the event of a real fire. On the drill day, teachers first showed students our "Fire drill" video, then everyone listened to the sound of the FIRE alarm to know what it sounds like. Lastly, teachers discussed how students would exit the building and go to their safety location. Our next drill in October will be an "outdoor" drill.

HOLD ON!

September 20, 2020 Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

IS 55:6-9; PS 145:2-3, 8-9,17-18; PHIL 1:20C-24, 27A; MT 20:1-16A

Though we can never fully grasp the infinite perfection of God and His ways, a basic knowledge of Scripture reveals that God's logic often differs from worldly logic.

Our first reading, from Isaiah, reminds us that God often thinks bigger than we do. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts." As His followers we must strive as best we can to think as God does, using our time (and our talents and treasure, too) with eternity in mind.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus offers us a glimpse of the "Godly logic" of the Father through a parable of a landowner hiring workers for his vineyard. Some workers are called early in the day, others not until very late. Yet the landowner pays them all a full day's wage. This angered the laborers who had worked longest. But those laborers were relying on human logic and human calculations. They were not thinking as God does.

This can happen to us Christian stewards as well. We can grumble and complain (at least internally) when we compare ourselves to others and sense that not everyone is contributing as much as we are to the parish, the neighborhood, within our family and so on. At those moments, we need to think bigger!

We must remember that it is a great privilege to have been called by the Father to work in His vineyard. Living the stewardship way of life brings us meaning, depth and purpose.

Let's embrace this Godly thinking and thank Him for calling us to this way of life.

150 ANNIVERSARY OF ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY PARISH

A little walk down memory lane with the Most Precious Blood Community and the second pastor of Assumption BVM, Rev. Henry Brockhagen. And so the historical story continues....

The Sisters of the Most Precious Blood presented an exquisitely embroidered stole to the second pastor of Assumption parish, Father Brockhagen (pastor from 1876-1910), acknowledging his priestly assistance in the difficult years of the sisters beginning in O'Fallon. The Sisters had been exiled from their native land by the "Kulturkampt" which was initiated and directed by Germany's Iron Chancellor Bismarck. Vicar General Muehlsiepen advised the Sisters to conduct their Community to America and to find a new Motherhouse in O'Fallon. The erection of their convent was begun in 1874 and in June 1875, the Sisters transferred the Community from St. Aatha's in St. Louis to O'Fallon.

A few Sisters had been occupying a little log house on the property, two of them teaching in the Assumption Parish School, which they had directed since 1873. The other Sisters supervised the work on the building and cultivated a little garden. Father Brockhagen assisted the Sisters with his agricultural knowledge. The Sisters, in turn, expressed their gratitude by giving their organist services gratis. This offering has continued for many, many years.

Father Brockhagen demonstrated his literary ability in his "Hausfreund", a weekly publication, which he had started a year previous. The St. Charles Democrat had been printing the paper until a gift was presented to him (a printing press). For a number of years he contributed articles to the St. Louis "Amerika" and the "Herold des Glaubens". Because of the nature of the articles some of them were amended and even destroyed by the editor of the "Herold," Mr. Schwarz. Father Brockhagen was highly incensed by this treatment on the part of a layman, so he decided to edit a newspaper of his own. In January, 1882, he sent out sample copies to all parts of the County of St. Charles and neighboring counties, asking for subscriptions. He entitled his paper, "Katholischer Hausfreund" ("Friend of the Catholic Home"). Father's motive was to promote Catholic knowledge and life for the Counties of St. Charles, Franklin, Lincoln and Warren. "Îell me what you read and l will tell you what you are. Have salt with you that you may not become corrupt. Published and Edited by Reverend H. Brockhagen."

The subscription was \$2.00 annually. The first regular number was issued May 10, 1882. At first the newspaper was printed in St. Charles, but Father's silver jubilee gifts enabled him to purchase his own printing press.

Very soon the "Katholischer Hausfreund" lost the character of a county paper, because the number of subscriptions increased and spread over all the states in the Union.

Two very serious mistakes eclipsed the value of the "Hausfreund". The first, Father made by believing absolutely any correspondent asking him for a decision and giving it without investigation. The second was considering himself competent in deciding matters of difficult theological problems without consulting approved authorities. These two faults effected the suspension of the paper by Archbishop Kain in 1895.

A few years later Father Brockhagen published his weekly under a different name the "0'Fallon Hausfreund". In the last number, published December 30, 1909, he said farewell to his readers. Financial difficulties and the infirmities of old age necessitated the discontinuance of the paper. Though the publication had faults, it had been a great blessing and consolation for many troubled persons.
