Hello,

Over the next few months our parish is starting something called **Pastoral Planning**. It is a means to assess where the parish is at, consider where we desire to be in the future, and determine and put into action the steps to get there.

One of the first steps in this process is called Visioning, where the entire parish is invited to participate to identify our strengths and challenges and where we desire to go. In normal times this would be done in person over a full day as a large gathering with break-out sessions by table and then coming back as the large group, but that isn't very realistic right now during the pandemic. Instead, we are going to try having these meetings over four evenings by ZOOM. Another parish has done it by this method recently and they had very good participation and results so we hope it will allow us to go forward even while we still can't have such meetings in person.

Each of the four evenings focuses on a different type of concern for the parish, and our first night will be focused on what is called **Formation**. I have to admit this word is a little different for most of us but I think I can best explain it with my first exposure to the term when it was used extensively when I entered the seminary. The seminary isn't just a school where you go to get a degree or education that allows you to be a priest, rather it is there to prepare people to become priests, to form them. Similarly in our school we are not just concerned with what might be described as academics, but we are focused on preparing young children to become who God created them to be, to help form them. To set them on the path to be able to hear God's call and reply. So they will not just learn English and Math and History, but also Scripture and Catholic teachings. They will learn about the sacraments and also be able to receive them. They will hopefully learn that they are loved and desire to love God and others. This is what we might call formation instead of just education. I thought this week being Catholic Schools Week it is an appropriate topic to start with, that in Catholic Schools we aren't just concerned with grades or test scores but with the person the child is becoming.

But Formation doesn't just stop with grade school. For our children it may take the form of our day school or our Parish School of Religion. For high school students it may be our Life Teen program. For adults it could be Bible study, or RCIA, or a CHRP retreat. Remember our Parish Mission last year with Fr. Sichko, that was a formation event that spanned across the generations. There are many different aspects to our formation as Catholics and hopefully it never stops throughout our lives.

Since we are celebrating Catholic Schools Week I hoped this would be an opportunity to get the attention and interest of some parents in participating in our vision for the future of our school. Others might be more interested in discussing what adult formation opportunities we should have. We invite all adults in our parish to participate in all four of our Visioning evenings this March but you are also welcome if you only participate in some.

Many more details will be coming out about our Visioning Evenings and Pastoral Planning, I hope we care about our schools, we care about our parish, and we care about the future, so we will all take part.

Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time

DT 18:15-20; PS 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9; 1 COR 7:32-35; MK 1:21-28

Our readings today remind us of God's authority.

As we reflect on our Gospel, we recognize that God possesses all authority and that we want to give Him all authority. Jesus was teaching in the synagogue on the Sabbath. All were fixed on His words and astonished at what He had to say.

Suddenly everyone's attention shifted to a man with an unclean spirit who began to question Jesus and His authority. Jesus responded, "Quiet, come out of him!" and removed the evil spirit from the man. All were amazed at the healing of this man.

Life can sometimes look like the synagogue in Capernaum. We are living as Disciples of Christ when we suddenly recognize evil around us — through events in our lives, temptations we are enduring, or by falling into sin. It can distract us, consume our attention, or even cause us to despair. In these moments of trial, we must remember the Healer in our Gospel today. Recall His words, "Quiet, come out of Him!" Jesus has the power and authority over evil, for He has conquered sin and death. He also has the power and authority over us. And when we invite Him to have that authority, He will heal us and help us persevere.

Today, we are reminded that God is in control and that we want Him to be in control. He is the loving Healer that will work miracles in our lives if we give Him the authority to do so.

From the Principal's Pen

Catholic Schools and History

January 31st begins Catholic Schools Week in the United States. Our theme across all states is, "Catholic Schools: Faith. Excellence. Service."

The mission of our school signals our daily focus: Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Elementary School, united in Christ and guided by the spirit of our Blessed Mother, is rooted in the Gospel message of love and acceptance. In educating the whole person, "Mind, Body, and Spirit", we transform each student through the power of faith and knowledge, inspiring each to bring Christ to the world.

In celebrating Catholic education, we must be thankful for the Society of Sisters, who after WW1, challenged the Oregon Governor, Walter M. Pierce, who passed a law so that all students would attend ONLY public schools.

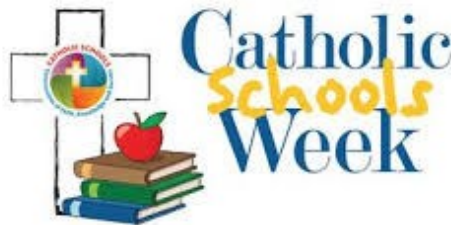
Some background:

After World War I, some states, concerned about the influence of immigrants and foreign values, looked to public schools for help. The states drafted laws designed to use schools to promote a common American culture.

On November 7, 1922, under Oregon Governor Walter M. Pierce, the voters of Oregon passed an initiative amending Oregon Law Section 5259, the Compulsory Education Act. The citizens' initiative was primarily aimed at eliminating parochial schools, including Catholic schools.

The Compulsory Education Act had required Oregon children between eight and sixteen years of age to attend public school.

The Sisters of the Holy Names sued Walter Pierce, the governor of Oregon, along with Isaac H. Van Winkle, the state attorney general, and Stanley Myers, district attorney of Multnomah County (of which Portland is the county seat, and where the Sisters were headquartered).



The Sisters' case alleges :

That the enactment conflicts with the right of parents to choose schools where their children will receive appropriate mental and religious training, the right of the child to influence the parents' choice of a school, the right of schools and teachers therein to engage in a useful business or profession. (268 U.S. 510, 532).

The Sisters' case rested only secondarily on the assertion that their business would suffer based on the law. That is, its primary allegation was that the State of Oregon was violating specific First Amendment rights (such as the right to freely practice one's religion). Their case alleged only secondarily that the law infringed on Fourteenth Amendment rights regarding protection of property (namely, the school's contracts with the families).

The school won the case before a three-judge panel of the Oregon District Court, which granted an injunction against the Act. The defendants appealed their case directly to the Supreme Court of the United States. The Court heard the case on 16 and 17 March 1925.

The right of parents to control their children's education without state interference became a "cause célèbre" following the case, and religious groups proactively defended this right from state encroachment. R. Scott Appleby wrote in the American Journal of Education that this led to a "remarkably liberal" education policy wherein religious schools are not subjected to state accreditation but only to "minimal state health and safety" laws.

ASH WEDNESDAY – February 17, 2021

Distribution of Ashes in Time of a Pandemic WILL LOOK DIFFERENT THIS YEAR

Ash Wednesday takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday, and is chiefly observed by Catholics, although many other Christians observe it too. Ash Wednesday comes from the ancient Jewish tradition of penance and fasting. The practice includes the wearing of ashes on the head. The ashes symbolize the dust from which God made us.

The Changes

The Presider says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: *“Repent, and believe in the Gospel,”* or *“Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.”*

The Presider then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. **The Presider, instead of making a sign of the cross on your forehead with ashes, takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.**

The Ashes

The ashes are made from the blessed palms used in the Palm Sunday celebration of the previous year. The ashes are christened with Holy Water and are scented by exposure to incense. While the ashes symbolize penance and contrition, they are also a reminder that God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts. His Divine mercy is of utmost importance during the season of Lent, and the Church calls on us to seek that mercy during the entire Lenten season with reflection, prayer and penance.
