Hello,

When I was studying in Washington D.C. and living at a parish there one of the other priests at the parish was from India. One day a parishioner asked me why that priest only bowed at some times during the Mass while all of the other priests she



knew genuflected? Good question I thought, he wasn't that old and I didn't think he had bad knees, so I asked him about it. He said that in his culture there were various different bows and while it was our custom to genuflect to Christ present in the Eucharist, it was their custom to have their most profound bow for that honor.

Consider the different postures we assume during Mass, genuflecting, bowing, kneeling, standing and sitting. Do we know why we are doing what we are doing or is it just habit? For myself the greatest understanding of this came when I was growing up in the 1970's when I went to some different churches and noticed some people were genuflecting before going into their pews, and others were bowing. None of them were from India, but was it just different customs? Or were some more holy or pious than others? And then one day I was instructed at a church that was being remodeled that because there wasn't a tabernacle in the worship space we were to bow to the altar where Mass would be celebrated when we entered instead of genuflecting to Christ in the tabernacle in the Eucharist. I know I was probably told that sometime before, but habits had just taken over and when I went into church I knew I was supposed to genuflect but not always thinking about why, but now I knew better. Since then, especially in the 1970's and 1980's when I was going different places and many churches were being remodeled and new ones built I recognized I wasn't the only one who let my habits guide my actions as opposed to always thinking about what I was doing. Sometimes the tabernacle was still in the main body of the church, but it was off to the side, so you had to hunt down the red candle by the tabernacle to realize where you should be genuflecting.

A simple summary for postures is listed in the document *Environment and Art in Catholic Worship*, "sitting for preparations, for listening, for silent reflection; standing for the gospel, solemn prayer, praise and acclamation; kneeling for adoration, penitential rites." (EAW 57) During Mass you may note that the priest genuflects after the Consecration when he shows the Body and then the Blood of Christ to the congregation, recognizing Christ's presence.

From this list, for certain parts of Mass there could be different options, depending on where the emphasis in the action being done is to be placed. That is why another value also needs to be considered, unity. "A common bodily posture, to be observed by all those taking part, is a sign of the unity of the members of the Christian community gathered together for the Sacred Liturgy, for it expresses the intentions and spiritual attitude of the participants and also fosters them. " (GIRM, 42) This is in the instructions for celebrating Mass, which I also mentioned to the Indian priest. Since he was going to be staying in the United States he needed to be aware of how some people saw his actions. Explaining them to others could help share his culture, but he also needed to be aware and consider how it could be misinterpreted and the division such small actions can make when deciding if he would continue this practice or not. And of course, others might just think he was getting old and had bad knees.

How easy it is, especially in these times, to be consumed by

From the Principal's Pen

Frog Legs aren't just for eating!

They always say frog legs taste like chicken, and I would have to agree. However, at school we're not eating those frog legs, we are dissecting them. Yes, our Middle School students have studied the various systems of the human body: muscular, circulatory, skeletal, digestive and reproductive systems and are now investigating these systems in

of mind and heart "Following Jesus is the work of a lifetime"



We use grass-frogs that are formal-

dehyde-free and we have them injected with dye so that the veins are blue and arteries are red. This helps our students identify easily the circulatory system. It is interesting for our students because, when dissecting the stomach, they have found beetles, June bugs, and other insects that had been eaten. In addition, they have opened some to find the eggs. They have extracted the brain, eyes, and tongue – and the girls aren't even squeamish - Way to go, girls :-)

Before the pairs of students began dissecting a real frog, Mrs. Schenk, their teacher, had them virtually dissect a frog. Literally, the students went to a

website and dissected a frog on the website using their mouse. Each time they cut correctly and identified the part, they were given points. Once completed, students understood the process and were confident to journey into the real world experience of dissecting.

What Matters or What is Matter?

If you would talk to our 2nd grade scientists, they would tell you that objects (matter) can be sorted and classified by properties and that those properties include color, flexibility, hardness, texture, and absorbency. 2nd graders also studied how the properties of materials determine their use.

Here are some of the investigations they completed in class:

While looking at the properties of straw, sticks, and bricks, they had to determine what properties made bricks the best suited to build a house.

Working together they brainstormed a list of possible structures that could be built with different materials. Then, with students in their groups, they built a small roller coaster where marbles had to roll after being pushed – but the teacher

gave each group a different material for building! Once built, it was time to test the roller coasters and compare how the different structures compared in their performance. It was very useful to compare the strengths and weaknesses of the materials used.

Lastly, the students played the quiz game of knowledge. Their teacher, Mrs. Cronin, asked questions and each student wrote his/her answer on their small white board. When everyone was done, they all raised their boards up - to see how they did.

Those smart little cookies knew the answers!
