Hello,

So have you gone back to restaurants yet? I've only gone to eat at outdoor ones so far myself, and fortunately we've had pretty good weather through the summer and going into the fall for that, but I'm not sure what I will do when things get colder. As changing conditions affect the decisions we make, and schools and sporting events and even movie theaters are opening with different restrictions, I thought it would be good to look at the decision to come to Mass or not.

At Assumption we are continuing to require people to wear masks when they are in the church except for when they are receiving Communion. Hand sanitizer is available at all entrances, no paper worship aides are used (all music and readings are projected on the walls), collection baskets are not passed (they are at entrances before and after Masses) and the pews and other areas people may touch are sanitized between each Mass. Social distancing is being kept by seating at least 6 ft. between households in pews and only every other pew being used. So far we have only used the balcony area for one of our normally scheduled Sunday Masses, but even our fullest Masses, the 5pm Saturday, 8am Sunday, and 10am Sunday, have barely exceeded 200 parishioners and there has always been plenty of space to maintain safe distancing. Hopefully this all minimizes risks for the spread of the virus at our Masses.

In addition to considering the risk of exposure when deciding to do something, we also take into account the value of what is done. Participating in Sunday Mass is so valuable for us that the Church considers it to be an obligation we have as Catholics to participate in Mass each Sunday unless it is impossible due to the absence of priests or another grave cause. I don't know how much you may like a certain restaurant or enjoy a certain sport, but I can think of reasons less than 'grave' to forego most of them. And while this obligation is currently dispensed, we need to consider the reason for this serious obligation and, ideally, our desire to participate in Mass.

You might ask, before the virus was a part of our lives, why did I go to Sunday Mass? Hopefully it wasn't just an obligation, but also a true desire to be united to God in this most intimate way, and to be united with others in worship. The masks and distancing cause noticeable differences, hopefully emphasizing even more ways we appreciated these gatherings that were taken for granted. I was able to anoint and bring the Eucharist to someone in the hospital this last week who is isolated in an assisted living situation and has been unable to come to Mass since March. I think she was considering it worth having to go to the hospital for the opportunity to receive the Eucharist. I discouraged her from considering that but it is always encouraging to see such a great desire for the sacraments. When we celebrate Mass together it is even more fully a participation and reception of this sacrament. How much do we desire and appreciate this greatest of gifts?

For those who are avoiding many activities due to health risks I would encourage you to consider watching our live-streamed Mass at 10am on Sundays. While it is not the same as being with us in person, it is a means technology allows us to share many aspects of our service together. Also, if you have been homebound and unable to come to Mass, you might consider calling to have someone bring the Eucharist to you at home. Peace and stay well,

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY ** Feast Day ~ October 7

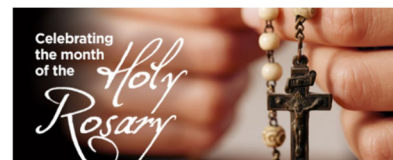
Many religions use beads to keep track of prayers. Our Rosary, a circle of beads, is like a garland offered to Mary because we pray a prayer on each bead. This well-loved prayer has its roots in the 150 psalms. People who couldn't read began praying 150 Hail Mary's instead, the equivalent of three of our modern rosaries covering the original three sets of mysteries.

The story of the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is an interesting one. In the 16th century Pope Pius V was having trouble with the Ottoman Turks, who were a real danger to Christianity. After months of disagreements and bickering, he was able to unite Spain, Venice, and the States of the Church in a naval expedition to fight the Turks.

The two navies met in the Gulf of Lepanto in Greece on October 7, 1571. On the same day, the Rosary Confraternity of Rome was meeting at the Dominican headquarters there. The group recited the Rosary for the special intention of the Christians at battle. The Christians defeated the Turks in a spectacular victory and believed it was the intercessory power of the Blessed Virgin that won the victory. Pope Pius V dedicated the day as one of thanksgiving to Our Lady of Victory. Pope Gregory XIII later changed the name to the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. The story of the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary focuses on the intercessory power of Mary. It shows that when Christians are in danger, they can go to Mary. And when an individual is in pain, discouraged, or having trouble accepting God's will, he or she can also go to Mary. She will pray to her Son for anyone who calls on her. Anyone who prays to Mary no longer feels alone because she prays with them and for them. Mary encouraged praying the Rosary in her apparitions. At Lourdes when she appeared to Saint Bernadette, Mary had a Rosary. As Bernadette prayed it, Mary joined in on the Glory Be prayers.

At Fatima Mary exhorted the three children who saw her to pray the Rosary for peace.

The Rosary is a deep prayer because as we recite the Our Fathers, Hail Mary's, and Glory Be's, we meditate on the mysteries in the lives of Jesus and Mary. No wonder it pleases Our Lady when we pray the Rosary.

IS 5:1-7; PS 80:9,12,13-14,15-16,19-20; PHIL 4:4-9; MT 21:33-43

Praying at all times *"In everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."* These are the words from St. Paul's letter to the Philippians that we hear in today's second reading. Elsewhere in his letter to the Thessalonians he says *"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."* St. Paul is urging us to pray in all circumstances and at all times.

But is it really feasible for us to pray at all times? While we may not be able to spend every moment praying in the chapel, we can still pray ceaselessly by offering up all of our acts as a prayer to God. St. Josemaria Escriva says that *"You can be sure that it is through the circumstances of ordinary life, ordained or permitted by the infinite wisdom of divine Providence, that we come close to God ... To this I now add that your work too must become a personal prayer, that it must become a real conversation with Our Father in heaven."*

As stewards, we can pray and be in union with God through our professional work as well as our charitable works for the parish community. If we offer up these moments of work to God as a means to commune with Him, we will begin to live out St. Paul's exhortation to pray ceaselessly. Let us strive to never forget the dignity and value of our work as stewards of Christ.

Summary

In today's second reading St. Paul urges us to pray ceaselessly in all circumstances. While we may not be able to spend every moment in the chapel, we can still pray ceaselessly by offering up all of our acts as a prayer to God. Let us strive to intentionally realize the dignity of our professional work, and our work as stewards, as a means to be in communion with God.

Egg Drop Soup?

Do our students end up with Egg Drop Soup when they are challenged to drop an egg from the KC Hall deck – or an unbroken egg?

Last week our 6th grade class, in learning about gravity and air resistance, were asked to develop some type of contraption that would allow a fresh egg to fall to the ground from a high distance without breaking. They were all given 45 minutes of class time to create a design with the following materials: trash bags, straws, tape and string.

Most came up with parachute methods of dropping the egg, but not all. Some created a basket, while others a tower with the egg in the middle. Ultimately 75% of the class were successful in not making Egg Drop Soup! . . . parachutes worked best.



\$500 Patterson Grant Awarded

James Patterson, Bestselling Author, in partnership with Scholastic Books sponsored the Patterson Grants Award Competition to "Grow Kids' Love of Reading". To receive a \$500 grant, teachers from across the country had to vie for an award by writing a 250 word essay on how they would effectively use recently published books that helped students love to read.

Mrs. Holly Woytus, 5th Grade Reading teacher, wrote her essay this past summer and was notified this week that she was a recipient of a \$500 grant to purchase books through Scholastic. The 5th graders were not only excited about her winning one of the grants, but thrilled to help select the titles that will be chosen. Some of the books mentioned have been, The One and Only Ivan, by Katherine Applegate, Inside Out and Back Again by Thanhha Lai, and The Year of Billy Miller by Kevin Henkes. All of these books have received the Newbery Award for Children's Books.
