Hello,

Since the practice of cremation is becoming more and more common, and this week we celebrate the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls, I thought it would make sense to comment a little on the Church's teachings regarding cremation. In 1963 an instruction was issued permitting cremation as long as it was not done as a sign of denial of our Christian beliefs. Then in 2016 the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued an instruction, "*Ad resurgendum cum Christo*" (To Rise with Christ) on "the burial of the deceased and the conservation of the ashes in the case of cremation." This newer instruction provided some additional details but was consistent with the words from previous instructions that allow for cremation "in the absence of motives contrary to Christian doctrine." (AR 4).

The primary intent of our burial rites are to maintain the proper respect for the body and to reflect in our actions and in the treatment of the remains this respect as well as our faith in the resurrection. Particularly when we are remembering and honoring those who have died we also reflect on our basic beliefs. We think about heaven, and hell, and purgatory. We reflect on the life of the deceased, as well as on our own. And we consider how we are to live out our lives and why. We desire comfort at this time, but also are seeking answers and truth. We know we will not get all of the answers we desire, but it is a critical time to know how much God cares for us and is with us especially when we are carrying our crosses.

For this reason the cremated remains are to be laid to rest in a sacred place where they may be visited both now and in the generations to come at places of prayer and remembrance. Specifically this is described as "in a cemetery or, in certain cases, in a church or an area, which has been set aside for this purpose, and so dedicated by the competent ecclesial authority." (AR 5) The practice of keeping the cremated remains in a home is recognized as not being such a place and is permitted "only in grave and exceptional cases" and then only with the permission of the bishop and for the national council of bishops to decide what these grave and exceptional circumstances may be. (AR 6)

The particular practices that continue to be identified as prohibited are the scattering of ashes, the preservation of the ashes in mementos or jewelry, or the division of the cremated remains to be kept or buried in various places. All of these are practices that are becoming more common and thus their prohibition needs to be known. The scattering of ashes portrays an understanding of life that is over, that we can only be useful in going back to nature and participating in the 'cycle of life'. But we believe God created us for a purpose that is beyond just this life on earth, and that our ultimate end is meant to be in a glorified body in heaven. Our final burial, whether cremated or not, should be in a place for prayer and remembrance, not divided or kept only for the memories of various individuals, but for the greater community of the Church.

Discussing and reflecting on death can be depressing or morbid to some, but hopefully we see it as a part of how we were created. As we have gone through a physical birth, so we will go through a physical death, but know that we are ultimately meant, like all the saints, for heaven.



ALL SOULS DAY – Monday, November 2nd

All Soul's Day is a Roman Catholic day of remembrance for friends and loved ones who have passed away. All Saints' Day, together with All Souls' Day is known collectively as Hallow tide. All Souls' Day remembers all those who have died, not just the great and the good, but the ordinary person on the street. **At the 7:00pm Mass** on November 2nd we will bring forward our Book of Remembrance to honor your family and friends who have gone before us. As part of a conclusion, we will process to the cemetery after the closing prayer. As part of our procession this year, we will have luminaries to light our way.



Book of Remembrance

As the month of November approaches, please know that we will be praying in a special way for all of our loved ones who have died. There will be sheets of paper at the doors on which we encourage you to write the names of family members and friends who have died. These sheets will be collected into our Book of Remembrance, and brought forward at Mass on All Souls Day, Monday, November 2nd so that we may pray for them with devotion, and remember them with love.



Thanksgiving Day 2020

Let's begin by celebrating Thanksgiving together! **Join us on Thursday, November 26**, and we will once again have a special Eucharistic celebration at 9:00am. It is special in several ways. First let this day be a reminder that "Eucharist" means "thanksgiving". Taking part in the Eucharist on Thanksgiving Day is a beautiful way to begin celebrating this holiday--we hope that you will join us.

We also invite you to bring gifts for the poor. These can be money or the usual items you bring for the St. Vincent de Paul Society. On this day, please **DO NOT** leave them at the St. Vincent de Paul Society Depository but bring them to your pews. At the time of the Presentation of the Gifts, you will be asked to bring your own gifts forward to bins that will be provided as a sign for us to see. The St. Vincent DePaul Society & Ushers/Greeters will be there to assist you. (*Safe distancing measures will be in place.*)

Finally, you are invited to also bring something that you will be using at your own Thanksgiving Dinner or taking to someone else's. Let it be anything--cooked or uncooked, that you can handle easily. Again, bring this to your pew with you. During the Intercessions, you will be asked to hold up these items to be blessed. After Mass take them home with you to be used for your meal.

We hope that this will help to make a connection between the Lord's Table and your own feasting table. In this way you are bringing God's blessing to your own table and might even use this item to focus your meal prayer that day.

We do hope that you will join us as one family at Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parish to give **Thanks to God for all that He has done for us!** **Please Note:** There will not be a 6:30am Mass on Thanksgiving Day.

October Was The Month of Mary

(Our Outdoor Classroom Statue of Mary)




The Rosary is a Scripture-based prayer with October and May considered the months of Mary. The Rosary begins with the Apostles' Creed, which summarizes the great mysteries of our Catholic faith. The Our Father introduces each mystery.

Were you aware that the first part of the Hail Mary was formed by the words by the angel of the Annunciation: "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you" (Lk 1:28), and then these words were added from Saint Elizabeth, who welcomed her cousin, Mary, "Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb" (Lk 1:42). Interestingly, the Second Part of the Hail Mary appeared in the Church in the 14th century, but its use did not become universal until St. Pius V promulgated the Roman Breviary in 1568 and ordered it to be prayed: "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen".

As we moved through the month of October, our 8th graders were tasked with developing a Prayer Service using the Rosary, on October 19th. Wanting to approach each grade level with age-appropriate information and prayer, students developed plans. The 8th graders chose to visit each homeroom say the Rosary, or, in some cases, a decade of the Rosary, as well as helping our students understand how and why the Rosary should be prayed.

For our Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students, a short video was shown explaining the Rosary, and then the children counted out 10 beads – each bead representing a Hail Mary. With each count, the assigned 8th graders led that class in prayer. Finally, each "little" received a coloring sheet about Mary and the Rosary.



For grades 1-5 students, 8th graders led students in creating a Lap-Book. A lap-book is a visual representation of interesting facts about a certain subject, in this case, the Rosary. Lap-books are a great hands-on method of teaching children and helps reinforce what is learned at school. The book will be a personal memory to take home and gives the opportunity to pray the Rosary daily.

For grades 6-8, students were shown an age-appropriate video giving its history and purpose, then together prayed the Rosary, announcing each Mystery before each Our Father. In addition, each student was given a "How to say the Rosary" pamphlet.

RV 7:2-4, 9-14; PS 24:1B-4B, 5-6; 1 JN 3:1-3; MT 5:1-12A

On this Feast of All Saints, we have the profound joy of celebrating our big brothers and sisters in Christ: the saints! This is an especially meaningful feast for us as Christian stewards.

At our Baptism, we all receive the call to holiness and discipleship — in other words, the call to sainthood. If we wish to go to Heaven, we must strive to become saints! Thankfully, through the stewardship way of life, we can each discover our unique path to do just that.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus reveals His Beatitudes. In them, our Lord lays out the characteristics that mark His disciples, His saints-in-the-making. As we examine, tweak, and update our commitments to the stewardship way of life, we must always keep these Beatitudes in mind as a measure of our progress towards saintliness.

The "*blessed*" that our Lord speaks of are not the different types of good people who get to go to Heaven. Rather, the "*blessed*" are the characteristics of the disciples of Christ. These characteristics — **poor in spirit, mourners, meek, hungering and thirsting for righteousness, merciful, clean of heart, peacemakers, persecuted for the sake of righteousness, and insulted** — can only be obtained with an abundance of grace. But we are children of God, so we have access to the infinite treasury of God's grace.

Armed with that grace and the stewardship way of life, we can have firm hope that one day we will join our big brothers and sisters in the never-ending joys and celebration of Heaven.
