Hello,



It is the first week of advent and I thought looking at the Advent Wreath, a German tradition adopted by many throughout the world

and probably our most recognizable symbol for the season, would be a good theme to tie my articles together, yet address distinct aspects of Advent each week. Growing up I know we had our advent wreath on the kitchen table and every night we would light the candles for that week for dinner. After dinner we would read a passage from one of the Gospels, possibly the Gospel for Mass of that day.

The Advent wreath is simply designed and yet rich in symbolism. (see next page for traditions and meanings of the Advent Wreath) The candles have been given different meanings. Over the next four weeks I will be focusing on the following meanings, the 1st one is Hope, the 2nd is Preparation, the 3rd and rose candle, Rejoice, and the 4th is Love. This is week one and we focus on Hope.

Hope is a positive sign. It recognizes that we are on a journey, has a "not yet" character to it, but demonstrates a faith and a trust as to what can be. It demonstrates an orientation that we have during a period of change or transition, a period that is temporary. This orientation is towards "being" and the journey may be described as "becoming" what God has meant us to be. This obviously then places Christ at the center of hope. He is the means by which we can become who we are meant to be, the one we are to follow on the journey, the one who opened the gates of heaven.

Sometimes something can be more clearly understood by recognizing what it is not. If our orientation is not towards "being", it is towards "nothingness". That is the opposite of hope which is called despair. If the journey is towards nothingness, then the present is all that we have and all that we are meant for since anything to come will only be less or worse. We can see plenty examples of this in our society that we need to use caution. Another form of hopelessness that needs to be recognized is presumption. This can be called a "false hope", a completely knowing anticipation that denies the journey, the way that we are on. Two extremes of this are one; that we have full control of our destiny, that by our actions alone we earn or attain eternal life and salvation. The second extreme of presumption is that our actions do not matter, but rather that we have already achieved or secured our salvation, and thus the journey or our way doesn't matter.

So in this Advent season it is proper to begin our journey in a state of hope. Our faith in Christ properly orientates us on our journey in this life,

towards Christmas and how we need to be open to all the ways Christ desires to come to us in this life, and to His eventual second coming and an eternal life in heaven.

The Advent Wreath Tradition & Meaning

For many Christians, Advent wreaths are a favorite way to celebrate the month of December leading up to Christmas Day. Although Advent Wreaths are popular among Christians, many are not aware of the rich meaning and symbolism embedded in the tradition. If we learn this meaning, we can appreciate it all the more!

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

The Advent candles readily demonstrate the strong contrast between darkness and light. In the Bible, Christ is referred to as the "Light of the World" contrasted with the darkness of sin. Human history spanned long ages before our prophesied Savior would finally make his appearance, and God's promise to make all things new through him.

As his Advent, or "coming," draws nearer another candle is lit, with each candle dispelling the darkness a little more. Thus, the Advent wreath helps us to spiritually contemplate the great drama of salvation history that surrounds the birth of God Incarnate who comes to redeem the human race.

SHAPE, NUMBER, AND COLOR

SHAPE: The circular shape of the wreath, without beginning or end, symbolizes God's complete and unending love for us—a love that sent his Son into the world to redeem us from the curse of sin. It also represents eternal life which becomes ours through faith in Jesus Christ.

NUMBER: The Advent Wreath traditionally holds four candles which are lit, one at a time, on each of the four Sundays of the Advent season. Each candle represents 1,000 years. Added together, the four candles symbolize the 4,000 years that humanity waited for the world's Savior—from Adam and Eve to Jesus, whose birth was foretold in the Old Testament.

Some Advent wreath traditions also include a fifth white "*Christ*" candle, symbolizing purity that is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas day. Many circular wreaths can incorporate a white candle by adding a pillar candle to the wreath center.

COLOR: Violet is a liturgical color that is used to signify a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice and is used during Advent and Lent. Advent, also called "little Lent," is the season where we spiritually wait in our "darkness" with hopeful expectation for our promised redemption, just as the whole world did before Christ's birth, and just as the whole world does now as we eagerly await his promised return.

THE FOUR WEEKS OF ADVENT

During the first two weeks of Advent we light the first two purple candles. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.

Then on the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the soon-coming birth of the King of Kings.

Traditionally, each of the four Advent candles have a deeper meaning which is depicted in the lovely Four Weeks of Advent Pewter Wreath:

The 1st Sunday of Advent symbolizes Hope with the "Prophet's Candle" reminding us that Jesus is coming.


- The **2nd Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Faith with the "*Bethlehem Candle*" reminding us of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- The **3rd Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Joy with the "*Shepherd's Candle*" reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.
- The **4th Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Peace with the "*Angel's Candle*" reminding us of the message of the angels: "*Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men.*" ~*Excerpts taken from the Catholic Company*

November 28, 2021 — First Sunday of Advent JER 33: 14-16; PS 25:4-5, 8-9, 10, 14; 1THES 3:12-4:2; LK 21:25-28, 34-36

Welcome to Advent, the season to prepare with awe and wonder for the Feast of the Incarnation of Jesus — born to us as Savior and Brother. It is a season to prepare for His return at the end of time. It is also a moment to remind ourselves that our individual judgment day is coming, too, when we will be called to give an account for all that God has given to us during our lifetimes. In other words, <u>Advent is a steward's season!</u>

Our readings for the first week of Advent waste no time in calling our urgent attention to these themes of reflection and preparation. They seem to shout, *"Wake up! Get ready!"* and offer us some practical advice as we enter into this season.

The Gospel, from Luke, warns, "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life." How easy it is to lose focus on our Lord either by too much indulgence in our lives or by too much worry about our lives. During Advent, we Christian stewards must ask ourselves some hard questions. Am I staying faithful to my prayer life? Am I using my energy and skills to serve others? Am I overly concerned about material gain? Am I relying on my "stuff" or my investments as my source of comfort or security? Am I living for the moment or for the coming of the Lord?


