Hello,

Today is the first day of Advent, and while people may have many different ways they decorate for Christmas, and many different objects may remind you of Christmas, there is really only one thing that we identify so strongly with Advent, the Advent Wreath. I know growing up my family had the Advent Wreath on our kitchen table and after dinner we would light the appropriate candle(s) and read a part of a Gospel, reading that whole Gospel in the season of Advent. I have heard of others who might have a certain prayer they pray together each day around their Advent Wreath, or possibly reading from a book of reflections. I can't say if we will have any left by the time you read this, but the parish has 500 copies of a program you might use as a family called "A Journey through Advent & Christmas" that might be a part of your Advent this year.

At Mass on the First Sunday of Advent we have a blessing of the wreath in church that we will be lighting throughout the season as we prepare for and grow closer to Christmas. The petitions and prayers in this blessing help tell us what we should be doing in our preparations, so I thought sharing them here might be appropriate:

General Intercessions:

That the keeping of Advent may open our hearts to God's love, we pray to the Lord.

That the light of Christ may penetrate the darkness of sin, we pray to the Lord.

That this wreath may constantly remind us to prepare for the coming of Christ, we pray to the Lord.

That the Christmas season may fill us with peace and joy as we strive to follow the example of Jesus, we pray to the Lord.

Prayer of Blessing:

Lord God, your Church joyfully awaits the coming of its Savior, who enlightens our hearts and dispels the darkness of ignorance and sin. Pour forth your blessings upon us as we light the candles of this wreath; may their light reflect the splendor of Christ, who is Lord, forever and ever. Amen

May you and your families have a blessed Advent.




Society of St. Vincent De Paul needs your help this Christmas!! **Neighbors In Need Christmas Day**

From the Principal's Pen

2nd Grade Prayer Chalices



Throughout fall, on a weekly basis, one second grade student in each class takes home a Prayer Chalice so it may be "filled with prayers". As members of the class receiving the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist this year, students also receive a binder of prayers to help each family deepen their appreciation for the Eucharist. All families review materials with their child and discuss the importance of Eucharistic Adoration, as well as some worship aides that help our students discover the meaning in this beautiful devotion.

Here is one of the "Celebrating First Eucharist" prayers that parent and child pray together:

Parent: After Jesus nourishes us in the Eucharist, we are asked to go out to be "Bread for the World". Eucharist calls us to help feed those around us who are hungry for food, others are hungry for love, or care, or friendship.

Parent: Some people in our world are hungry for food. They don't have enough to eat.

Child: Open our hands, God. Help us to share what we have with others.

Parent: Some people in our world are hungry for care. They are sad or lonely. They need comfort and support.

Child: Open our eyes, God. Help us see the needs of those around us.

Parent: Some people in our world are hungry for friendship. They are excluded because others think they are different in some way.

Child: Open our hearts, God. Help us to share your love with others.

Together, make a commitment to bring the love of Jesus to someone in need by asking and discussing the following:

Someone we know is in need of help is . . .

This person is hungry for (food, love, care, friendship, prayers) . . .

We will help bring Jesus' love and care to this person by . . .

Parent and Child: AMEN

Vocations and 6th Grade

The 6^{th} graders are asked to pray with their families in search of a vocation, whether religious life, single life, or married life. Research shows that those choosing religious life, first considered these vocations around 6th grade. We provide information on what a "vocation" is and how to discern so that each 6th grader may best serve God and others.



Who is Entering RELIGIOUS Life?

Just who is considering religious life is tracked by a number of different organizations, including the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA), the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops

(USCCB), the National Religious Vocation Conference, and VISION Vocation Network.

Newer entrants identify their primary reasons for coming to religious life as a sense of call, a desire to deepen their prayer and spiritual life, and a desire to live and work with others who share their faith and values.

In the United States

- Newer entrants are attracted to communities that have a strong Catholic identity, are hopeful about their future, have members who live together in community, and have a structured prayer life.
- There are more than 66,000 religious sisters, brothers, and priests in the United States in more than 800 religious institutes (approximately 600 institutes of women and 200 of men).
- Nearly 1,000 U.S. women are in formation preparing to become sisters.
- More than 100 women and men in the U.S. profess perpetual vows annually.
- Fifty percent of new religious report that they were 17 or younger when they first considered a vocation to religious life.
- In 2014 approximately 477 entered priesthood—266 to diocesan priesthood (from 114 dioceses) and 96 to religious priesthood. Among religious orders, the largest number of respondents came from the Jesuits, Dominicans and Benedictines.
- The average age of entrance to religious life is 30 for men and 32 for women.
- Newer entrants are 58 percent Caucasian; 21 percent Hispanic/Latino/a; 14 percent Asian/Pacific Islander; 6 percent African American; 1 percent other.
- 70 percent of newer entrants have a bachelor's degree when they enter. *Information gathered from the follow source:* http://cara.georgetown.edu/CARAServices/requestedchurchstats.html





The Advent Wreath Tradition & Meaning

For many Christians, Advent wreaths are a favorite way to celebrate the month of December leading up to Christmas Day. Although Advent Wreaths are popular among Christians, many are not aware of the rich meaning and symbolism embedded in the tradition. If we learn this meaning, we can appreciate it all the more!

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

The Advent candles readily demonstrate the strong contrast between darkness and light. In the Bible, Christ is referred to as the "Light of the World" contrasted with the darkness of sin. Human history spanned long ages before our prophesied Savior would finally make his appearance, and God's promise to make all things new through him.

As his Advent, or "coming" draws nearer another candle is lit, with each candle dispelling the darkness a little more. Thus, the Advent wreath helps us to spiritually contemplate the great drama of salvation history that surrounds the birth of God Incarnate who comes to redeem the human race.

SHAPE, NUMBER, AND COLOR

SHAPE: The circular shape of the wreath, without beginning or end, symbolizes God's complete and unending love for us—a love that sent his Son into the world to redeem us from the curse of sin. It also represents eternal life which becomes ours through faith in Jesus Christ.

NUMBER: The Advent Wreath traditionally holds four candles which are lit, one at a time, on each of the four Sundays of the Advent season. Each candle represents 1,000 years. Added together, the four candles symbolize the 4,000 years that humanity waited for the world's Savior—from Adam and Eve to Jesus, whose birth was foretold in the Old Testament.

Some Advent wreath traditions also include a fifth white "Christ" candle, symbolizing purity that is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas day. Many circular wreaths can incorporate a white candle by adding a pillar candle to the wreath center.

COLOR: Violet is a liturgical color that is used to signify a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice and is used during Advent and Lent. Advent, also called "little Lent," is the season where we spiritually wait in our "darkness" with hopeful expectation for our promised redemption, just as the whole world did before Christ's birth, and just as the whole world does now as we eagerly await his promised return.

THE FOUR WEEKS OF ADVENT

During the first two weeks of Advent we light the first two purple candles. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.

Then on the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the soon-coming birth of the King of Kings.

Traditionally, each of the four Advent candles have a deeper meaning which is depicted in the lovely Four Weeks of Advent Pewter Wreath:

The **1st Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Hope with the "*Prophet's Candle*" reminding us that Jesus is coming.

The **2nd Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Faith with the "*Bethlehem Candle*" reminding us of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

The **3rd Sunday of Advent** symbolizes Joy with the "Shepherd's Candle" reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.

The 4th Sunday of Advent symbolizes Peace with the "Angel's Candle" reminding us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."
