Hello,

Advent is starting already and while it isn't the shortest Advent ever, Christmas is on a Wednesday so we do have 3 days in our fourth week of Advent, but it is the shortest time

between Thanksgiving and Christmas that we can have. While some may have had Christmas decorations up and even Christmas songs on the radio from early November, most of us start to seriously think about it once Thanksgiving is over.

One reason we can get a bit ahead of ourselves in the preparation is that we don't wait until Christmas to celebrate Christmas. Civilly it seems like Christmas is being celebrated for a few weeks leading up to Dec. 25th, and then once that day hits it is over. I am not against some Christmas parties ahead of this time and recognize decorations being up beforehand help us in our anticipation, but sometimes this can just take over and the only preparation we did was for the civil celebration of the holiday, and the religious holy day we celebrate gets lost.

Advent is our time to prepare for that holy day. To consider how we can be more open to receive Christ in our lives, to recognize the great gift God has made by coming to us as a man, to reflect on this miracle and what it means to us. I was in 5th grade classrooms this last week and the teachers had asked me to talk about the Incarnation. My first thought was how do I explain some of this to 5th graders? But as I've found when trying to discuss mysteries of our faith with children, it usually is a good opportunity for myself to consider what I know and believe. Sometimes adults may have words that describe and communicate some general ideas, but we can also just get caught up in using the words and not take the time to really ponder what they mean. When we talk about the Incarnation, we are stating that Jesus is both God and man, in the flesh. (Both infinite and limitless as God and yet also taking on a form that is finite and limited as a human.) From the early church on, the temptation to over simplify this mystery has led to many heresies; for example, just considering Jesus as God appearing as man (Gnostic Docetism) or how the Nestorians and Monophytes considered him a man that God then treated or changed in a special way. While we will never fully understand the Incarnation, we can better receive God's gift if we try to gain some appreciation for how incredible it really is!

Remember only 24 more days until Christmas, happy Advent.

P.S. You might also consider that this is the start of flu season. There may be times for some of us when it would be more appropriate to forgo shaking hands for a greeting or sign of peace and a word and a smile may be kinder to accept or give. The flu is not the gift we wish to share this season.

The Advent Wreath Tradition & Meaning

For many Christians, Advent wreaths are a favorite way to celebrate the month of December leading up to Christmas Day. Although Advent Wreaths are popular among Christians, many are not aware of the rich meaning and symbolism embedded in the tradition. If we learn this meaning, we can appreciate it all the more!

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

The Advent candles readily demonstrate the strong contrast between darkness and light. In the Bible, Christ is referred to as the "Light of the World" contrasted with the darkness of sin.

Human history spanned long ages before our prophesied Savior would finally make his appearance, and God's promise to make all things new through him.

As his Advent, or "coming," draws nearer another candle is lit, with each candle dispelling the darkness a little more. Thus, the Advent wreath helps us to spiritually contemplate the great drama of salvation history that surrounds the birth of God Incarnate who comes to redeem the human race.

SHAPE, NUMBER, AND COLOR

SHAPE: The circular shape of the wreath, without beginning or end, symbolizes God's complete and unending love for us—a love that sent his Son into the world to redeem us from the curse of sin. It also represents eternal life which becomes ours through faith in Jesus Christ.

NUMBER: The Advent Wreath traditionally holds four candles which are lit, one at a time, on each of the four Sundays of the Advent season. Each candle represents 1,000 years. Added together, the four candles symbolize the 4,000 years that humanity waited for the world's Savior—from Adam and Eve to Jesus, whose birth was foretold in the Old Testament.

Some Advent wreath traditions also include a fifth white "Christ" candle, symbolizing purity that is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas day. Many circular wreaths can incorporate a white candle by adding a pillar candle to the wreath center.

COLOR: Violet is a liturgical color that is used to signify a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice and is used during Advent and Lent. Advent, also called "little Lent," is the season where we spiritually wait in our "darkness" with hopeful expectation for our promised redemption, just as the whole world did before Christ's birth, and just as the whole world does now as we eagerly await his promised re-

THE FOUR WEEKS OF ADVENT

During the first two weeks of Advent we light the first two purple candles. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used

to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.

Then on the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the soon-coming birth of the King of Kings.

Traditionally, each of the four Advent candles have a deeper meaning which is depicted in the lovely Four Weeks of Advent Pewter Wreath:

The 1st Sunday of Advent symbolizes Hope with the "Prophet's Candle" reminding us

The 2nd Sunday of Advent symbolizes Faith with the "Bethlehem Candle" reminding us of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

The 3rd Sunday of Advent symbolizes Joy with the "Shepherd's Candle" reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.

Today we begin the beautiful season of Advent. It is a season meant for preparation. For what exactly are we preparing? Two things: the celebration of our Savior's birth and the anticipation of His second coming.

These are weighty tasks with eternal consequences. So, let us stewards make the words of the Prophet Isaiah our motto for the season: "Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain to the house of the God of Jacob that he may instruct us in his ways and we may walk in his paths."

In the weeks leading up to Christmas, it seems everywhere we turn we are pushed to do more to create a "perfect" Christmas day. But the Church's guidance to use these weeks to focus on our spiritual lives can indeed seem like a mountain-climb.

The intentional use of the gift of time is what the Christian steward is called to do, and with even greater intensity during Advent. How can we use our time to prepare for Jesus' birth on Dec. 25 and for His second coming at a date we do not know?

We can push back against the world's pressure to have the "perfect Christmas." Scale back on materialism so we have more time for spiritual preparations: Confession, weekday Mass, adoration, family prayer time, lighting the Advent wreath, acts of kindness.

In the end we will be prepared to celebrate a truly meaningful Christmas, be-come more like our Savior and be ready for Him to come again. ~ Excerpts from: Catholic Diocese of Wichita
