Hello,

We are at the third Sunday of Advent already, and less than two weeks left until Christmas, so I was thinking last week about Christmas trees. Not only is it one of the primary Christmas decoration traditions (I know people



who consider where they would put a Christmas tree when they are looking at houses to buy), but it is also a part of our Church's tradition so I thought I would share with you some of that information and paraphrasing or quoting directly from the Catholic Church's Book of Blessings on the Order for the Blessing of a Christmas Tree.

The origins of the Christmas tree are from the medieval period where they referred to a tree of paradise and the Christmas light or candle symbolizing Christ. The tree was normally set up just before Christmas and would be kept up until the Feast of the Epiphany. Normally they would be put up in a home, but they could also be placed in a church. I think the most informative part about the Christmas tree isn't given in the introduction for the blessing (which is where I got the above information), but rather in the two options they have for the Prayer of Blessing itself that are as follows:

Lord our God, we praise you for the light of creation: the sun, the moon, and the stars of the night. We praise you for the light of Israel: the Law, the prophets, and the wisdom of the Scriptures. We praise you for Jesus Christ, your Son: he is Emmanuel, God-with-us, the Prince of

Peace, who fills us with the wonder of your love. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we illumine this tree. May the light and cheer it gives be a sign of the joy that fills our hearts. May all who delight in this tree

come to the knowledge and joy of salvation.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

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Holy Lord, we come with joy to celebrate the birth of your Son, who rescued us from the darkness of sin by

making the cross a tree of life and light. May this tree, arrayed in splendor, remind us of the lifegiving cross of Christ, that we may always rejoice in the new life that shines in our hearts.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen

As you can see the blessings tell us that the tree is to remind us of Christ and the eternal life he offers us. That seems like a pretty joyful thought. Peace,

The Story of Mary, Mother of God

Mary's divine motherhood broadens the Christmas spotlight. Mary has an important role to play in the Incarnation of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. She consents to God's invitation conveyed by the angel (Luke 1:26-38). Elizabeth proclaims: "Most blessed are you among women and blessed is the *fruit of your womb*. Without naming Mary, Paul asserts that "God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law" (Galatians 4:4). Paul's further statement that "God sent the spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying out 'Abba, Father!'" helps us realize that Mary is mother to all the brothers and sisters of Jesus.

The precise title "**Mother of God**" goes back at least to the third or fourth century. In the Greek form *Theotokos*—God-bearer—it became the touchstone of the Church's teaching about the Incarnation. The Council of Ephesus in 431 insisted that the holy Fathers were right in

calling the holy virgin *Theotokos*. At the end of this particular session, crowds of people marched through the street shouting: "Praised be the *Theotokos*!" The tradition reaches to our own day. In its chapter on Mary's role in the Church, Vatican II's *Dogmatic Constitution on the Church* calls Mary **"Mother of God"** 12 times.

Reflection

Other themes come together at today's celebration. It is the Octave of Christmas: Our remembrance of Mary's divine motherhood injects a further note of Christmas joy. It is a day of prayer for world peace: Mary is the mother of the Prince of Peace. It is the first day of a new year: Mary continues to bring new life to her children—who are also God's children. *Excerpts taken from Franciscan Media*

All of the items were delivered to St. Vincent in early December, hoping to help those individuals and families wanting gifts for the holidays.



A little walk down memory lane with some of our long-time parishioners who have themselves, as well as their family history, have been with Assumption from either the beginning or for many, many years. We presented some questions to long time parishioner, *Ruth Rothermich* who has a long family line and history here at Assumption. Enjoy reading...

What is your fondest memory of Assumption Parish?

Our beautiful, old, church, now called the Chapel with exquisite stained glass windows, excellent architecture, dome of sanctuary, but the painted artwork was formally more beautiful, no pillars, rounded ceiling accented with walnut wood-work, bricks laid artistically and much more. When the church was almost finished it was noticed there were no steps to the choir loft so metal spiral stairs were added. During Fr. Burke's time, the present steps replaced the metal steps.

What is your fondest memory of Assumption school?

Precious Blood Sisters in full habits teaching, strict but very good. Mass every day, uniforms every day, school picnic at end of school year with all created games, to name one, sack races; hot dogs, soda (glass bottles) and more. And, once a year, Coca Cola Co. came to our school and gave every student a 6 ¹/₂ once glass bottle of Coke, of which we each drank at

our own desks, and a wooden ruler with words inscribed, "Do unto others as you would do unto you". What a treat because not many of us ever got soda!

What years have you been at Assumption Parish? I started in 1932 and I'm still here! What years did you attend Assumption School?

Grade School – 1938-1946. High School 1946-1950. At 5yrs old for 3 years I walked 3 miles to school, from where Planethaven on Firma Rd is located, and still there is the house I lived in. For 4 yrs, I rode a Francis Howell school bus, then drove a car for 2 years. Believe it or not, the grade and High School attended Mass every day, no complaints from parents and children, and we had confession every other Friday. Awe, the good ole days.

How many generations of your family where in Assumption parish and Assumption School?

5 that I know of. My dad, Antoine Prinster, attended the 2-year high school but had to quit because his dad, Henry Prinster, had an accident on the farm so my dad, at age 16, took over the farm. His dad died at the young age of 46 leaving 6 children. *To be continued...*

December 13, 2020 — **Third Sunday of Advent** IS 61:1-2A, 10-11; LK 1:46-50, 53-54; 1 THES 5:16-24; JN 1:6-8, 19-28

Today we celebrate the Third Sunday of Advent, **Gaudete Sunday**. "Gaudete" is a Latin word, meaning "rejoice". The Christian steward should be characterized by a spirit of rejoicing.

Our First Reading, from Isaiah, expresses a fitting motto for us. "*I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul.*" It is God Who is the source of our joy and contentment — not things or achievements or comfort, but our relationship with God.

This is why stewards can share so freely of their time, talents and material possessions — because ultimately, we are not attached to these things. We recognize them as good gifts from our loving Father, but we are attached to the Giver of the gifts, not the gifts themselves. This allows for great freedom in life and the capacity for great joy in the Lord.

We can become like John the Baptist, in today's Gospel passage from the Book of John. We read this description of the prophet: "*He came for testimony, to testify to the light… He was not the light but came to testify to the light.*" This is our calling too — to testify to the Light, our wonderful Savior — by the way we make use of the time, talent and treasure He has entrusted to our care.

When God Himself is the source of our joy, it cannot be taken away from us. There is still time, this Advent season, to clear away any "clutter" in our lives that may take our focus away from Him. Let us strive to detach from any of these things so that we can be free to truly rejoice in God on Christmas Day.
