## Hello,

I don't know if you've spent some time for prayer in our chapel lately, but we have had two additions for most of Lent to hopefully help us in our reflection and prayer, especially as we grow closer to Holy Week. The first is a life-sized photographic negative image of half of the Shroud of Turin provided to us by Ann Kullman. I don't know how familiar most of you are with the Shroud of Turin, but it is a 14-foot linen cloth bearing an image of a crucified man that some consider the authentic burial Shroud of Jesus Christ. The Catholic Church has made no specific pronouncements about the authenticity of the Shroud but has recognized how it has affected many in the over 600 years since it has been publicly exhibited. The details that stand out in the photographic negative of the Shroud were not observed until 500 years after it was first publicly displayed. Numerous tests and theories have been proposed for how the Shroud could have been made, but to date none have been able to replicate it. Pope Francis stated about the Shroud, "The Shroud draws [people] to the tormented face and body of Jesus and, at the same time, directs [people] toward the face of every suffering and unjustly persecuted person."

Also on loan to our parish is a painting of Christ's crucifixion titled "The Glance of Love" by Evelyn Astegno. Evelyn is a parishioner whose painting is a beautiful depiction of the suffering and pain that Christ endured out of love for each of us. It will be in our chapel through next weekend at which time it will be exhibited in the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis for Holy Week. Hopefully both of these present an opportunity for reflection and prayer during the season of Lent as you can spend some time in the presence and adoration of Christ in the Eucharist.

I also wanted to take this opportunity to let people know how well our Vision Meetings for Pastoral Planning went. The number of participants varied from 85-120 a night and the ZOOM break-out rooms worked very well to facilitate discussion and allow participation of all who joined. The discussions were good for me to hear (I could go from group to group to listen and participate in the different rooms) but also appeared to provide people the opportunity to meet different parishioners that they didn't know and hear different perspectives and experiences, allowing some fellowship that has been hard to achieve this last year. At the end of each of the meetings each break-out group listed Strengths and Aspirations for our parish under the pillar (topic) for the evening. Then we compiled those together to allow everyone to vote on the ones they considered greatest or most important. In a few weeks we will have compiled a survey that will be put out to the entire parish on the Strengths and Aspirations that were identified regarding Formation (education), Worship & Prayer, Service & Hospitality, and Administration.

As in the season of Lent we take time to examine our lives and hopefully see the ways we may grow closer to God, I look forward to this Pastoral Planning process being a means by which our parish can grow as the body of Christ and bring each of us closer to God.



#### Palm Sunday - March 28, 2028... A walk with Jesus

We know the length of the first Palm Sunday procession: it's something like two miles from the Mount of Olives to the city of Jerusalem. But we really don't know the pace of that procession of Jesus, his disciples and the large crowd. Was it fast or slow? Solemn and stately, or rather disor-

ganized? We can't get into a time machine and go back to find out. But wonder of wonders, this year we will not have any kind of procession, we will stand and swing our blessed palms in the air singing Hosanna and let Jesus: the one who bore all our ills and infirmities; the one who renews our spiritual youth through his powerful grace; the one who eagerly ran his race to win our salvation; the one who leads us in our faith.

#### Follow the leader

The spiritual procession of our Palm Sunday will be perfect for each of us as we enter into another Holy Week. On Palm Sunday, we follow Christ our Life where he leads us: to death to self. But Jesus never turned back: "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39). Sometime, somewhere, in some circumstance, each follower of Jesus will need to say and mean these words, the words that mean death to self but life in Christ. This is God's paschal mystery, God's Easter plan for our salvation in the dying and rising of Jesus, in which we share through baptism.

Many people carried palm branches that first Palm Sunday; only Jesus carried the cross on Good Friday. But because he did, we find strength to follow his way of the cross through our *self-sacrifice*. Holy Week can be a great week for us if we enter more deeply into the dying and rising of Christ. The greatness of this week comes from what Christ has done for us in the past and does for us now. "We do not live-in ungrateful forgetfulness," said St. Augustine, "but we celebrate in grateful memory." Our "grateful memory" sets us on our "closer walk" with Jesus on Palm Sunday and during Holy Week.

## Easter Triduum ~ Holiest days of the year!

Soon we will begin the holiest days of the year... the Easter Triduum. On *Holy Thursday*, we reen-

act the Lord's Last Supper, which He shared with His apostles on the night He was betrayed and arrested. This is one of the most beautiful liturgies of the entire liturgical year. On this night, priests all over the world will renew their sacred vows. This is because, at the Last Supper, Jesus not only instituted the Mass (Eucharist) but also the ministerial priesthood.

On *Good Friday*, the day of the crucifixion and death of our Lord, we have the veneration of the Cross. The Stations of the Cross is held at three o'clock in the afternoon (the hour He is believed to have died) and we will have a service later in the evening to venerate the cross. Due to the pandemic, veneration will consist of parishioners kneeling in their pews, while the cross is elevated, showing honor and respect for Christs sacrifice for our sake. There is no consecration of the Eucharist on this day, and the Communion we receive will be from the night before, which has been reserved in the tabernacle.

Holy Saturday is a vigil. We keep watch for the expectant rising of Our Savior. This was the day He went down into the netherworld in order to bring back up with Him into heaven those who had died before His coming. Up to this time, the gates to heaven were closed and no one could go there because of the original sin of Adam. Jesus changed all that. By paying the price for our sins on the Cross, He gained for us our eternal salvation, and heaven was opened once more. Also on this night, persons who have spent months of preparation will be received through Baptism and Confirmation into the Catholic Church for the first time. It is a joyous occasion. Those who engage themselves wholeheartedly in living the entire paschal cycle (Lent, Triduum and Easter's Fifty Days) discover that it can change them forever. This is especially so of the Triduum which, standing at the heart of the Easter season, is an intense immersion in the fundamental mystery of what it is to be Christian. During these days, we suffer with Christ so that we might rise with Him at His glorious Resurrection. Holy Week is a time to clear our schedules of unnecessary activities. Our minds and hearts should be fixed on Jesus and what He did for us. Let us bear the Cross so that we may be worthy of wearing the crown He wore.



## From the Principal's Pen

#### **Extracting DNA from Strawberries**

As you may know, our Science program is designed for hands-on opportunities, for all grade levels. This past week, our 7th graders, who study Biology, worked to extract DNA from a Strawberry. Thanks to special characteristics of strawberries,

it's relatively simple. Our students were excited about the prospect and took their time to do the extraction process.

In order to extract and isolate the DNA, the students followed this process (you might want to try it at home!).

Put a bottle of isopropyl alcohol in a freezer to chill.

Then measure 6T of water into a small glass container. Add 2 tsp dish soap to the water, and stir in a ½-tsp salt and mix until the salt dissolves. This is the extraction mixture.

Place one strawberry into a plastic zipper-lock bag and pour the extraction mixture into the bag with the strawberry. Remove as much air from the bag as possible and seal it closed.

Use your hands and fingers to mash the strawberry inside of the bag. There should be no large pieces remaining. Pour the resulting strawberry pulp and extraction mixture through a strainer and into a

medium glass bowl or similar container.

Use a spoon to press the mashed bits of strawberry against the strainer forcing even more of the mixture into the container. From the container it's in now, pour the extraction mixture into a smaller glass container that holds 1/4- to 1/2-cup of fluid. This will help to isolate the DNA on the surface of the mixture.

Add 1 tsp of the chilled isopropyl alcohol to the solution and hold the mixture at eye level. You're looking for a separation of material that shows up as a white layer on top. That's the DNA of the strawberry!


Use the tweezers to gently remove the DNA from the solution and lay it on

The long thick fibers that are pulled out of the extraction mixture are real strands of strawberry DNA. As you may know, DNA is present in every cell of all plants and animals and determines all genetic

traits of the individual organism.

While other fruits are soft and just as easy to pulverize, strawberries are the perfect choice for a DNA extraction lab for two very good reasons: (1) they yield way more DNA than other fruits, and (2) they are octoploid, meaning that they have eight copies of each type of DNA chromosome. (Human cells are generally diploid, meaning two sets of chromosomes.) These special circumstances make strawberry DNA both easy to extract and to see.

To extract the DNA, each component of the extraction mixture plays a part. Soap helps to dissolve cell membranes. Salt is added to release the DNA strands by breaking up protein chains that hold nucleic acids together. Finally, DNA is not soluble in isopropyl alcohol, especially when the alcohol is ice cold.







#### March 21, 2021 - Fifth Sunday of Lent

JER 31:31-34; PS 51:3-4, 12-13, 14-15; HEB 5:7-9; JN 12:20-33

As we are nearing the end of our Lenten journey, our readings today remind us of the goodness that our God has to offer us.
