

Hello,

As we celebrate Palm Sunday and begin Holy Week I thought I would describe one of the Holy Week services that we do not have at our parish, or *any* other parish in the diocese except the Cathedral. The Chrism Mass. The Chrism Mass is ideally celebrated on the morning of Holy Thursday at the cathedral of a diocese. We have our Chrism Mass in St. Louis at 10:00am this Thursday morning. Some dioceses, because of geography or reasons that would be difficult for the clergy and others of the diocese to make that time, celebrate it on another day near to Easter. At this Mass the holy oils of the Oil of the Sick, the Oil of Catechumens, and the Oil of Chrism (thus the name of the Mass) are blessed to be used throughout that diocese in the coming year.

The Oil of the Sick is used for the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. This oil is used for strength and healing of the sick person. Of the three oils, this one is used most often at a parish. Also, if a parish runs out of it, or it is not available, a priest can bless oil during the rite of the anointing to use for the sacrament.

The Oil of Catechumens is used for those to be baptized. This oil is to give strength to the person to renounce sin as they prepare to approach baptism. For adults to be baptized it can be used in the months prior to the person's reception into the Church. For infants, it is used in the beginning of the Rite of Baptism.

The Oil of Chrism is used in the sacraments of Confirmation, Ordination, and Baptism. When a person is confirmed they are told by the bishop or priest, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit" as a sign of the cross is made with the oil on the person's forehead. At ordination to the priesthood the bishop puts the oil on a priest's hands to anoint them to be used to celebrate the sacraments. At the Chrism Mass the priests that are present will also renew their priestly promises. At a bishop's ordination the oil is put on their head as the leader of the local church. For a new church the oil is also used to anoint the altar and the walls of the church during its consecration. You might notice the priest sniffing this oil before he uses it to be sure he has the right one. This is because unlike the other two oils, the Chrism has perfume that is mixed into it before the bishop blesses it, as a sign of the roles of priest, prophet, and king that we share with Christ. This oil is also used on the crown of a child's head at baptism as a sign of this partaking in the threefold role of Christ.

Actually the oil blessed at the Mass will be taken, as soon as it is blessed, to be poured into hundreds of little bottles for the priests then to take back to their parishes. That evening, at the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper at our parish, we will be bring forward these oils to be used at the Easter Vigil and throughout the year. I would encourage you to participate in our parish services throughout Holy Week, and maybe this year or another time, try to attend the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral. The 8th graders in

our day school usually go down to participate in this Mass. They know that the Chrism Oil that is being blessed at this Mass, will be used for their Confirmations.

TODAY we celebrate Palm Sunday – A walk with Jesus

We know the length of the first Palm Sunday procession: it's something like two miles from the Mount of Olives to the city of Jerusalem. But we really don't know the pace of that procession of Jesus, his disciples and the large crowd. Was it fast or slow? Solemn and stately, or rather disorganized? We can't get into a time machine and go back to find out. But wonder of wonders, this year we will not have any kind of procession, we will stand and swing our blessed palms in the air singing Hosanna and let Jesus: the one who bore all our ills and infirmities; the one who renews our spiritual youth through his powerful grace; the one who eagerly ran his race to win our salvation; the one who leads us in our faith.

Follow the leader

The spiritual procession of our Palm Sunday will be perfect for each of us as we enter into another Holy Week. On Palm Sunday, we follow Christ our Life where he leads us: to death to self. But Jesus never turned back: "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39). Sometime, somewhere, in some circumstance, each follower of Jesus will need to say and mean these words, the words that mean death to self but life in Christ. This is God's paschal mystery, God's Easter plan for our salvation in the dying and rising of Jesus, in which we share through baptism.

Many people carried palm branches that first Palm Sunday; only Jesus carried the cross on Good Friday. But because he did, we find strength to follow his way of the cross through our *self-sacrifice*. Holy Week can be a great week for us if we enter more deeply into the dying and rising of Christ. The greatness of this week comes from what Christ has done for us in the past and does for us now. "We do not live-in ungrateful forgetfulness," said St. Augustine, "but we celebrate in grateful memory." Our "grateful memory" sets us on our "closer walk" with Jesus on Palm Sunday and during Holy Week.



Wow! The past several weeks we moved into a period of more intense spiritual preparation, consisting more in interior reflection than in catechetical instruction, and intended to purify the minds and hearts of the elect as they search their own consciences and do penance. This period is intended, as well, to enlighten the minds and hearts of the elect with a deeper knowledge of Christ the Savior. In order to inspire in the elect, a desire

for purification and redemption by Christ, three scrutinies are celebrated. By this means, first of all, the elect are instructed gradually about the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every

person longs to be delivered and thus saved from its present and future consequences. Second, their spirit is filled with Christ the Redeemer, who is the living water (gospel of the Samaritan woman in the first scrutiny), the light of the world (gospel of the man born blind in the second scrutiny), the resurrection and the life (gospel of Lazarus in the third scrutiny). From the first to the final scrutiny the elect should progress in their perception of sin and their desire for salvation.

Palm Sunday is our time to quiet ourselves, to enter into a time of spiritual retreat with open hearts and minds, and to trust that the Spirit of God will continue to guide them through their day and the sacramental celebrations of full initiation into the Church. They were encouraged to let go of any concerns or anxieties and to allow themselves to experience the love of God, the support of the community, and the action of the Spirit in their lives in all that they experienced this day. The time of preparation brought them closer to the full initiation into the life and mission of the Church that they have been longing for. Reflections and prayer were brought forth to begin Holy Week. Your prayer cards were given out and time was spent in quiet reflection. The weekend provided an opportunity for our Candidates to engage in their first reconciliation. Scriptures, Stations of the Cross and Christs seven last words were brought together with quiet reflection and alone time.

The Importance of Grandparents in a Child's Life

Following our **Grandparent/Favorite Adult - Day** on Friday, April 8, I wanted to speak loudly about the importance of a grandparent OR a favorite adult (other than a parent) in the life of a child.

1. They wrap your child in endless love.

While parents might have been up in the night and awake since the crack of dawn and frazzled from the stress of juggling work and parenthood, Grandparents have more time and patience to shower their grandchildren with love and attention.

They have the time to really focus on their grandchildren – to get down on the floor and play with them, to hold their hands on a walk and talk to them.

It's also an unwritten rule that grandparents are allowed to spoil their grandchildren more than a little and can relax the rules from time to time.

They might give extra treats, later bedtimes, longer bedtime stories or just let their grandchildren have more fun and simply be children.

This is often a breath of fresh air and a welcome change from time-pressured parents.

2. They can be the calm in the storm.

Because they are free from doling out discipline Grandparents hold a unique position. They can listen to their grandchildren without judgment, criticism or without having to lay down the law.

Instead they can gently guide them to find a solution or to feel better. They are a shoulder to cry on and a listening ear for all sorts of problems. Especially those that grandchildren might not feel as easy talking to their own mum and dad about.

Spending time with grandparents can act as a buffer against the busyness and stress that children can feel in their lives.

3. They share all sorts of new skills

Grandparents have a whole host of skills and wisdom that they share with their grandchildren. And they make the most patient teachers.

There's nothing lovelier than helping Grandma bake a cake or learning how to knit a scarf. There's nothing more fun than helping Grandad finish his crossword or fix the lawnmower.

The lessons that Grandparents teach are organic and unstructured. They just happen during time spent with them and kids can join in at their side.

Because there's no pressure, children are often keener to learn too.

They have so much fun by their grandparents' side that often they don't even realize they are learning at all.

4. They make our children happier

Studies have proven that children who have a close relationship with their grandparents are happier.

Research from the University of Oxford is just one study, which found that grandparents play a vital role in children's wellbeing. The study of over 1500 children found that those who had a strong relationship with their grandparents had fewer emotional and behavioral problems than those without.

And that this support lasts throughout the turbulent teenage years. The study found a link between grandparental involvement and adolescent wellbeing.

The relationship between your kids and their grandparents is one to be treasured. It makes their lives richer, better and happier in so many ways.

5. They're the keepers of communities

Grandparents are *family historians*. They share stories and secrets of times gone by with their grandchildren. They can make history come alive.

Wide eyes light up as grandchildren hear tales about how Great Grandma had to use powdered eggs to make cakes during the war. Or how Grandad had to catch a steam train to school, where he was scared of getting the belt from the fierce geography teacher. They often keep up established family traditions. They bring the extended family and cousins together for high days and holidays. Whether it's rolling eggs at Easter time or all searching for the silver sixpence in the Christmas pudding, they make their grandchildren's lives a little more fun.
