

Hello,

I assume that most of you have heard that the Supreme Court may soon issue a decision that overturns Roe v. Wade. The possibility of this has been speculated about over the last few years as new judges have been installed on the Supreme Court, but when a draft of a decision was leaked last week, it appears that it might become true in just a few months. Recognizing this, it might be a good time to pause and reflect about what this may do, and what is the true goal.

First, what would overturning Roe v. Wade do? Roe v. Wade is not a law, but a decision by the Supreme Court that it was unconstitutional to prohibit a woman's right to privacy, which included the ability to have an abortion during certain stages of pregnancy for certain reasons. Thus it prohibited state laws from declaring all abortions illegal, but left open the possibility of different states having different laws restricting at what stages of pregnancy and for what reasons an abortion may be legal. Over the last 50 years numerous cases have been heard by the Supreme Court that have effectively broadened or narrowed the laws a state may enact and enforce without violating the constitutional right Roe v. Wade declared. So if Roe v. Wade is overturned (and possibly other subsequent decisions that were based upon it), the states would now be allowed to pass laws more strictly limiting or even completely prohibiting abortions.

Second, why do we care? This needs to always go back to the question about when a life begins. Even in the Roe v. Wade decision they recognized that the unborn child was an individual person who could not simply be killed and disposed of at the will of the mother. This is why it included words considering that when a fetus was "viable", or could survive outside of the womb, states could regulate abortions. Scientifically, the new person is created and life begins at conception. From that point they grow and develop, but they are a unique person from their mother already. We celebrate this in regard to Jesus when we celebrate the Feast of the Annunciation. The difference from 'conception' until the time the baby is considered "viable", is their absolute dependence upon their mother. During this period of time the question is - 'Does the right of the child to live outweigh any burdens this might place upon their mother?'

In our faith, in our country, in humanity, the right to life always comes first and is the most basic right that must be protected before all other rights. The Catholic Church shows this belief clearly in the teachings regarding the death penalty for criminals, stating that the death penalty can only be considered "if this is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor." (CCC 2267) The Church considers such situations to be "very rare, if not practically non-existent" today. (CCC 2267) In the case of an abortion, not only is the baby the most innocent of any persons, but they are also the most defenseless. The mother of an unborn child, nor those who would assist her, do not have the right to kill that child by having an abortion. And the fact that the child is completely defenseless places a duty upon us to defend that child and all children as we can.

Laws protecting the rights of unborn children, prohibiting abortions, are the clearest way to protect them in our society and why Roe v Wade and its possible overturning are so important. But we also have to recognize the truth that even if abortions are made illegal in every state, that will not prohibit everyone from seeking and obtaining an abortion. The true recognition of these most innocent of lives needs to be a constant effort in our laws, in our words, and in our actions. Most of the greatest blessings in our lives come with challenges and difficulties that can seem unsurmountable at times, and the challenges facing many pregnant women needs to be recognized if we are going to be able to communicate with them, let alone help them to see the truth of the child they are caring for in their pregnancy.

Overturning Roe v. Wade appears to be a real possibility that we have been seeking for a long time, but it will not end the temptation of or the practice of abortions. Let us continue to strive to show our love and respect for all life; of the unborn child, of the expectant mother, of all human life that is a gift from God.

RCIA

In last week's bulletin you read about what Mystagogy is. To refresh, it is evident that the Mystagogy can be a time of rich spiritual meaning and growth for new members of the Catholic

church. For practical purposes, these reflections on the meaning on the Mystagogy can be expressed in the following summary of the key objections for the neophytes during the final of segment of the RCIA:

- Reflection on the meaning of the Gospel.
- Experience of the mysteries of the Catholic faith especially the Paschal Mystery.
- Appreciation for the sacramental understanding of the Church.
- Understanding of the Eucharist as the central reality of the Catholic faith.
- Participation in the fellowship of the Church community.
- Participation in a ministry of service role in the Parish.

This is a time for the community and the neophytes together to grow in deepening their grasp of the paschal mystery and in making it part of their lives.

Does that surprise you a little? The "why" of this period is not first of all focused on the neophytes but on the community. This is a time for the community to grow in understanding the paschal mystery. The neophytes, now full members of the community, also grow in their understanding. But we don't separate them out and make this period all about them. It's a community focus. So then, "why" we do this is so that the community (including the neophytes) will more deeply understand the paschal mystery and make it part of their lives. What we are supposed to be doing during this period (all of us, not just the neophytes) is gospel, Eucharist, and charity. In other words, Sunday Mass. We start this week with the Eucharist.

The Engineering Design Process - 8th Grade Science

As 8th graders move into the last month of school, they continue their hands-on learning of science, with this being Engineering Design. Students had three choices to develop, design and build their working design: Pinball Machine, Video Game Board, or Foosball table. The engineering design process is a series of steps that engineers follow to find a solution to a problem. The steps include problem solving processes such as determining your objectives and constraints, prototyping, testing, and evaluation. The engineering design process emphasizes open-ended problem solving and encourages students to learn from failure. This process nurtures students' abilities to create innovative solutions to challenges in any subject!



The Process includes:



Students followed the process of asking questions, imagining, and then sketching their idea /plan, as they created a prototype. They checked to see if the prototype functioned well, and if not, questioned, "Why?", then re-imagine, re-sketched, and re-built the machine. Hands-on is the best way to learn....

Congrats 8th graders!

Pinch and Coil Pots – 5th grade ART

Using air-dry clay, the 5th grader designed their own pinch or coil pot. After drying, the pots will be sealed and then students will paint them. Here's the process they used:

Step 1: Roll a Ball of Clay. Air-dry clay is very cool! It's easy to work with and doesn't require oven baking or firing in a kiln.

Step 2: Pinch Your Pot. Pinch pots are super fun and easy to make! They are a great alternative to making a pot on a wheel. Flatten the top of your ball of clay. Insert your thumb into the center of the clay.

Step 3: Smooth it out. Carefully, flip your pot over and place it on a clean surface. Dip your finger in a bit of water and smooth out your clay.









Student's Work

Step 4: Dry. Air-dry clay will harden within 24 - 48 hours, depending on your climate.

Step 5: Varnish. Air-dry clay is not waterproof! If you would like to use it for a planter, you need to seal it so water won't seep through.

Step 6: Paint Your Pot! Painting is my favorite part! Air-dry clay absorbs the paint quickly, making a nice flat-looking surface.

A LOVE THAT IS UNCONDITIONAL, SACRIFICIAL, AND PERMANENT

One of the untold stories about our country's armed forces is of the priests who serve the spiritual needs of those who defend us. One priest who served bravely and faithfully was Fr. Emil Joseph Kapaum.

A few years after he was ordained, he decided to serve as an army chaplain and was eventually sent to minister to the troops fighting in Korea in 1950. During one especially fierce battle, he was given the opportunity to fall back to a safer location in the field. However, he refused, preferring to stay by the side of the wounded and dying. He was finally captured by the Chinese forces and was marched 87 miles to a prisoner of war camp in

North Korea.

During his stay at the camp, he regularly risked punishment to visit the other prisoners offering them comfort, hearing their confessions, and celebrating Mass. Often he would go without food to share it with the sick. He died in the prisoner of war camp of starvation and pneumonia on May 23, 1951.

Those soldiers who knew Fr. Kapaun called him their hero. His humility and love helped them endure imprisonment, torture, and hours of interrogation. He was also remembered for the holiness of his life which radiated through all he did.

In today's Gospel, Jesus encourages us to love one another as he has loved us. He tells us in another place in Saint John's gospel that there is no greater love than to lay down one's life for another. Jesus showed this love by his willingness to be humiliated, scourged, and crucified for our sins. Fr. Emil Kapaun also gives us an example of such love in everything he did, especially in his willingness to sacrifice his comfort, his health, and eventually his life for his brother soldiers.

It is precisely this type of love that Christ is calling us to express in our everyday lives. We often think of love merely as a feeling of affection between spouses, family members or friends. It is an emotion or an attachment that is shared and reciprocated. If I love you, I expect you to love me back. We also know that this type of love does not always last. We lose touch with friends, or we get into conflicts with them that cause resentment. The minute one person stops loving the other, the relationship comes to an end.

However, this is not the type of love which Jesus is calling us to have. This is not the type of love that sets his disciples apart. Rather, the love of Jesus is not based on feelings, on whether the other person loves us back or on how convenient the relationship is. Instead, Jesus' love is unconditional, sacrificial, and permanent.

The love of God is demanding. It requires much of us. The only way it is possible to live such a love is to realize that God has loved us first. When we experience the unconditional, sacrificial, and permanent love of our Heavenly Father, we will find the strength and inspiration to love in just the same way. It is the love that Jesus showed on the cross. It is the love that Fr. Emil Kapaun and countless other saints have shown in their ministries. And it's that love that we are called to show in everything we do.

O GOD, TRINITY OF LOVE, FROM THE PROFOUND COMMUNION OF YOUR DIVINE LIFE, POUR OUT UPON US A TORRENT OF FRATERNAL LOVE.

GRANT US THE LOVE REFLECTED IN THE ACTIONS OF JESUS, IN HIS FAMILY OF NAZARETH, AND IN THE EARLY CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY.
